In Council

We have seen a lot happen in Broomfield in the last few months all of which points to an exciting future for the village. A summary of the main issues is below:

Broomfield Place

It has always been the Parish Council's position that the land behind Broomfield Place should not be developed without a new school being part of the plan: 'No New School, No New Housing'.

We were simply sticking to the original proposal in 2008. This said that a growing village needed a larger school, so the school would move to this new site (south or west of Broomfield Place); the existing school site would be redeveloped for housing, to help fund the move. However, after 10 years of discussions between the County Council and developers, nothing definite had been achieved. During the last year, the idea of moving the school was abandoned and it was agreed to extend the school on its existing site instead.

Then, about 4 months ago, just when we thought it was all over, we were all surprised to learn that ECC had agreed to sell the land south and west of Broomfield Place to a developer, who wanted to get permission to build on it. In other words, for a while it seemed that we'd get the new housing without the new school!

With the help of your County Councillor, John Aldridge, we worked hard to persuade the County Council not to proceed. We pointed out that Chelmsford City Council has removed the site from the Local Plan and there wouldn't be enough primary school places if they went ahead. We offered alternative uses to benefit the community and even tried to have the land designated as an Asset of Community Value.

Fortunately it worked, because on 4th July the County Council issued this statement:

"The Cabinet Member at County Hall responsible for property, recognises the impact that the potential planning proposal would have on the education demand in the area. As such, she has decided not to proceed with the conditional sale of land adjacent to Broomfield Place. The use of any proposed site needs to work locally with the community and must consider the impact on surrounding services and infrastructure. Any future use of this site will be considered with this in mind."

So, thanks to the determined stand that our Planning Committee took and thanks to support from Cllr Aldridge, we got there in the end! Not only have we seen off the threat of a large development, we've also opened up the possibility of the land being used for the community instead.

The Parish Council is now forming a small team of residents and councillors to consider how the land can be used creatively for the community, now that large scale residential housing has been ruled out. If this does include some form of construction, we expect it to be something of benefit to the community; also, that some of the land will be retained as open space, for the use of the wider community. If you would like to be a part of this discussion that shapes the future of Broomfield Place, please let Parish Office know of your interest.

Adventure Cycle Way

Probably the most exciting decision made at our May meeting was to proceed with the next phase of building the Adventure Cycleway. This project started life as a recommendation from parishioners following an exhibition in the Village Hall on future projects that potentially be pursued and was seen as a facility for the young people of the village. It has taken a long time and a great deal of work to bring it to fruition. From a modest beginning as an idea at an exhibition, it has grown to include disabled access to the track itself and an additional twenty five public car parking spaces. We are particularly grateful to Councillor Trevor Jones who has put in many hours working with the office team to make this happen. We are also grateful to the Officers at Chelmsford City Council who share our enthusiasm for a project which should be valuable to Broomfield but also the City as a whole. We have now appointed a contractor and work will start this September

Defibrillator

Although the parish has a very large hospital and an ambulance station, we do not have a publicly available defibrillator and there is a clear need for one. We are very grateful to Rebecca O'Mahony, a local resident who has been generous with her time and knowledge to advise the Council on the merits of different defibrillators and mounting boxes. This life saving piece of equipment will be installed soon; I really hope you never need to use it, but it is a reassuring thought to know it is there.

Village Fun and Games Day

The Summer Fun Day was a tremendous success and huge thanks are due to the team but especially Councillor Sue Hubble who worked tirelessly to bring it all together. There is a detailed report later on in the Broomfield Times. We know that the village has all sorts of events throughout the summer and we have been wondering if these could come together and achieve an even bigger event. We will be inviting other clubs and societies around the village to join us at an open meeting to see if there are opportunities to work together.

The Barn at the allotment site

Money is tight, and like you, the council has to keep an eye on its assets to make sure that they are working hard. One of the council's main assets is the allotment barn which is currently occupied by Broomfield Cottage Gardeners (BCGS). Although this is a socially worthwhile use, some may argue it could generate a greater financial income. The Council therefore has been looking at other ways to use the barn. A structural survey confirmed that the barn is in good condition so the council investigated using the barn for commercial storage and using the rent to fund other projects in the parish. When we took into account the representations of BCGS, the history of the site, and the financial risks associated with a change of use, we decided not to pursue this idea. We did discuss whether it would be possible to make part of the building available for other community groups and these conversations will continue.

Community Speed-Watch

Some years ago we obtained a Radar speed measuring device from Essex Police for use in Broomfield. This has been used occasionally but due to lack of support from residents has lain idle for about the last two years. Essex Police have noticed this and asked if the speed device could be returned to them.

Before relinquishing the unit the subject was raised with the Parish Council to see if a way could be found to maintain the service in Broomfield.

A few people have been trained in the use of the speed gun and we have obtained clearance from the police to use this in School Lane as well as the original site on Main Road, nevertheless, there has been almost no interest in those trained taking part in a speed check session.

Compliance with the legal speed limits is not generally a problem in the village and monitoring of speeds has shown that speeds are mostly well below the legal limits (see Broomfield Times, Summer 2017, p45). This means that the speed checks do not catch many miscreants. However, they do remind drivers that there is a speed limit that should not be exceeded. Unfortunately, it does nothing to educate drivers about the "appropriate speed" which, in many instances, should be well below the posted limit.

The Parish Council would like to maintain the checks and are investigating ways to involve more village residents, of all ages, in monitoring the speeds through the village. Please contact the Parish Office if you would like to be involved.

Nts Your Village, Have Your Say

The Neighbourhood Plan was the main attraction at this year's Annual Meeting for residents on 23rd May.

First, we wanted to give everyone more details about the Residents' Questionnaire from last year. The feedback gave us a huge amount of information, since nearly 500 questionnaires were returned, covering the views of 800 people. So, many of the displays brimmed with pie charts, bar charts and tables showing what local residents like about Broomfield (almost everything except the traffic!); what they want to change (particularly the impact and level of traffic); and how the inevitable changes of the next 15 – 20 years can best be managed to limit the downside of development and make the most of opportunities.

Just as important were the displays about how the Neighbourhood Plan might come together over the next few months and what it might contain. After carefully studying the Questionnaire responses, the Steering Group has produced some suggestions about the way forward. For instance, we've proposed a number of cycle paths and other traffic reduction measures (maps were on display). This picked up on the feedback that residents would cycle more if there were more and safer cycle paths.

At the Annual Meeting, we wanted to encourage the community to continue the discussion about these and other suggestions. For instance, which areas of Broomfield countryside should be most protected from development; and what sort of houses should be built if Broomfield has to accommodate more housing.





I Pick Up Litter from Outside My House. Do you?



From the County Council



My two years as Chairman of Essex County Council came to an end in May this year. I can now reflect upon the great privilege it has been to serve the Council and the people of



Brumfelda News

Brumfelda is Broomfield's Local History Group and is named after the Domesday Book's name for Broomfield.

The inspiration for the group was the late Ken Searles, who published "*Buildings of Broomfield*", but said there was at least one more building that was not in his book. He suggested it would be interesting to investigate fields where there have been significant Roman finds over the years. You may have noticed Roman brick and tile in the construction of nearby St Mary's Church.

Councillor John Blake and Neil Wiffen gathered together a score or so of interested people in the summer of 2012. They negotiated with the farmer who generously agreed to allow field walking at specified times and they organised the first field walk in autumn 2012. Subsequent field walking



has taken place in 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017. The field walking has yielded many kilos of Roman brick and tile fragments, hypocaust, a variety of pottery sherds (greyware, terracotta,

Samian ware), oyster shell, animal bone and coins.

To inform the group, a series of talks were delivered between 2012 and 2015 from local experts including archaeologists, historians, metal detectorists and geologists. Geophysicists were employed in 2015, 2016 and 2017 to conduct resistivity and magnetometry surveys of the field that have intriguingly indicated the presence of a 15x15 metre square building.

Chelmsford Museum are supporting this project and will store the interesting finds for us but hopefully there will be an opportunity to display some in Broomfield.

1st Broomfield Scout Group celebrates its Centenary

It was on 11th September 1918 that an entry in the Chelmsford Scouts minute book reads -"A scout troop has been started at Broomfield and is doing well." Wilfred Hall started with a troop of 17 scouts and meetings were held in "The Garage; Broomfield Hall". This ran successfully for a


number of years then, following a break, in 1938 "Timber" Mundy became the scoutmaster and Ivan Gladwin the cubmaster with "Skipper" Goodley the Group Scoutmaster. During WW2, the group was kept going by the senior scouts in the Church Hall. They helped the war effort by recycling wastepaper and jam jars and in the clear-up of St Mary's Church after a German plane dropped a bomb that blew-in a stained glass window. In 1949 Derek Cox, a Broomfield scout since 1942, became an assistant scoutmaster (aged 20).

In 1955 Broomfield entered the annual London & Home Counties Scout Soap Box Derby at Crystal Palace winning the Cub Shield in their car Red Flash built by Fred Buck. In 1958 meetings moved to a "new" hut which was erected on the edge of the allotments off School Lane. Fred Buck ran the senior scouts as a Sea Scout patrol and in 1963 seven of these lads achieved the Queen Scout award and one, Roger Watts, attended the World Scout Jamboree in Greece.



1967 saw big changes in Scouting with new uniforms; section names and programmes. In 1969 the scout troop went to Holland for the Haarlem Jamboree and the cost was £9 each. In 1971 a second cub pack was started called Dinizulu with the other pack named Kantankye. Roger Cole joined the group as assistant Cub Scout leader in 1972. Fundraising for a new HQ had been running for several years under chairman Vernon Hilton and in 1974 a new HQ was finally opened.

In 1977 an Air Venture Scout Unit was started

at Broomfield called Pegasus. In 1978 the group purchased their first minibus and started collecting wastepaper around the village whilst our annual fundraising book sales started shortly after.

1980 the horse chestnut tree on Angel Green



had to be felled so the scouts planted a new one (though this too was felled in 2015 due to disease). In 1983 Stuart Penn attended the World Scout Jamboree in Canada and the scout troop made another visit to Haarlem travelling in their newly acquired 32 seater bus. Furniture and household auctions were started in the 1980s with Delmas Ashford as auctioneer whilst in 1984 Broomfield started the first Beaver Colony in Chelmsford District.


In 1985 Dinizulu Cubs won the "Take Time for Tea" competition having interviewed two Broomfield ladies who were the granddaughters of the judge who tried the Zulu chief Dinizulu captured by Baden-Powell





in 1890. The prize for the pack was a day at Colchester Zoo with a celebrity visit from Sarah Hardcastle the 1984 Olympic swimmer.

1986 was the 70th anniversary of cub scouting and the cub packs took part in a national event at Gilwell Park narrated jointly by 1st Broomfield father and son – Roger and Cub Scout Simon Cole.



In 1988 the cubs joined the Broomfield Players in their production of Toad of Toad Hall acting as the numerous rabbits; stoats and weasels. Derek retired as Group Scout Leader after more than 40 years with the group and his wife Joan



retired as secretary after 23 years' service. Derek had been awarded both the BEM and the Scout Silver Acorn in recognition of his dedication to youth work. The Cox family had been one of the mainstays of the group supported by many loyal friends. Roger became Group Scout Leader.



In 1991 the World Jamboree in South Korea was attended by Broomfield scout Martin Chapman. To celebrate 75 years of the scout movement the group had a campfire singsong, performing 75 songs in 75 minutes.

When the Church Hall was demolished in the mid-90s, the scout HQ was offered as a meeting





place to the local Guides, the Brownies and the Rainbows. In 1999 Broomfield scouts Richard Plummer and Richard Butler went to the World Jamboree in Chile.



The millennium was marked with a large District Camp at Skreens Park. Things started fine – but on Saturday the rain started and didn't stop. The site became flooded and a "civil emergency" was declared. Campers had to be evacuated, though 1st Broomfield was OK in our sturdy marquee. In 2005 several Broomfield scouts attended the EUROJAM Jamboree at Hylands Park with 10,000 participants.

The group won the Chelmsford Borough Council Environmental Award for their wastepaper recycling efforts. In 2006 the scouts went to both Kandersteg scout chalet in Switzerland and to Paris. 2007 was Scouting's centenary and the World Scout Jamboree at Hylands Park with 40,000 scouts and guides from over 200 countries in camp. In 2008 we ceased collecting wastepaper doorto-door in Broomfield. But the skip remains



at the HQ and we continue to recycle paper and cardboard as this is our main fundraising activity. In 2010 we were pleased to welcome back former cub leader Malcolm Taylor as the Group Chairman.



In 2012 Ruth Reed became deputy Group Scout Leader to work alongside Roger, who finally "retired" in 2013 after 40 years' service with the Group. In the 2014 St George's Day scout honours Roger received the highest award – the Silver Wolf for "exceptional service" to Scoutina". In 2015 funds were successfully sourced to buy the lease on our land. In 2016 all three sections were running at full capacity and our cubs won District hiking; swimming and football events. And so to 2018 - the 1st Broomfield Scout Group continues to thrive with an enthusiastic leader team serving almost 100 young people from the village including a second scout troop for pupils of Columbus School.

In writing this history, it is quite humbling to realise that the success of the Group over its 100 years has been down to the dedication and commitment of so many local people – not only as leaders but also volunteers, families; friends and supporters of the group. Long may this continue!

Obituaries

<u>Brian Talley,</u> 11th August1946 - 31st May 2018



Brian was born in Buckhurst Hill, one of three brothers. On leaving school, he went into Freight Forwarding which he continued in until his retirement, working variously in London, Maldon, Basildon and Thurrock. He married Wendy in 1969 and they moved to Broomfield where they remained for the next 48 years. They both enjoyed camping holidays and later switched to a caravan, visiting most parts of the UK.

Having had an interest in politics all his adult life (he and Wendy met in the Young Liberals), Brian was elected to Chelmsford Borough Council in 1979 and represented Patching Hall Ward for twelve years. In 2012, Brian became one of the founder members of Broomfield U3A, serving as Membership Secretary for two years. As a member, he took part in the bridge, geology, cookery and book groups and he also played table tennis.

Brian did not enjoy good health throughout his life. At the age of ten he contracted meningitis which left him needing to learn to walk and to write again. Then, in his thirties, he developed rheumatoid arthritis which he never allowed to prevent him from working or pursuing his other interests.

Finally in January 2017, he was diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease, following the loss of his voice during the autumn of the previous year. He coped with it in his usual stoical manner, using a notepad, a tablet and sign language to communicate. Many of his friends will remember the thumbs up which meant that something hadparticularly pleased him.

When he was no longer able to get about, he enjoyed watching TV, particularly sport, and reading. He sent his last review to the U3A book group only weeks before his death. He had to tell them, "I could not recommend this book".

At the end of May, Brian was admitted to hospital with a chest infection from which he didn't recover.

He was always cheerful and outgoing and enjoyed helping people. He is greatly missed by his family and many friends.

<u>Ian Hughes</u> 15 January 1940 – 11 July 2018



Ian Hughes was born and brought up in Hereford. On leaving school he joined British Rail and stayed with them in a variety of roles for some thirty years latterly as area manager for their catering facilities. His career involved him relocating on a number of occasions and he and his family moved to Chelmsford in 1969.

Ian moved to Broomfield with his Wife and two daughters in May 1979 and for almost forty years immersed himself in Broomfield village life, becoming a well known and respected member of the community.

He served as a Broomfield Parish Councillor for some thirty years and for the majority of that time he acted as Chairman of the Civic Amenities Committee overseeing the management of the Village's assets and open spaces.

This role covered the village allotments, trees and children's play areas and he was instrumental in the creation of Centenary Wood where he ensured the children of the Primary School were involved in the initial planting of many trees.

He was also involved in the construction of the barn and lean-to on the allotment site. He continued to give advice to the Parish Council long after his retirement and his wealth of knowledge and experience was always welcomed. lan had a wonderful feel for the countryside and his knowledge of trees, plants and birds and the pattern of wildlife was second to none.

He was Tree Warden for the Village and for the Churchyard and planted many trees in the Village including the native Black Poplars at the bottom of David Smith field, the Hornbeams on Angel Green and the American Elms on Parsonage Green.

He was a regular attendee at the Parish Church where he was a bell ringer for a period of time. He also organised a "programme" for management of the Church grounds, introducing a regular volunteer working party.

Ian was a true "all rounder". In addition to his Parish Council responsibilities he was recognised in the Village as the ultimate "do it yourself specialist". He was constantly changing the size and shape of his house and was greatly admired for his ability to "demolish and restore" using his self-taught building skills.

In 2003 lan was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. He fought his illness with great courage and tenacity and, quite remarkably, despite his illness, continued to achieve a great deal.

lan leaves his Wife Morag, two daughters, Lorna and Rhona, his son-in-law and two grandchildren.

Michael Wiffen 14th December 1929 – 4th June 2018



Market Gardener of Broomfield

Michael Wiffen was Broomfield through and through. He was born on 14th December 1929 in the Lodge of the Orchards, a large house which was located where Vellacotts is now, and where his father was the gardener. Michael and his father filled

their days with digging and planting, weeding and hoeing, potting on and harvesting. They were renowned for their tomatoes although lettuces, spring onions, dahlias, chrysanthemums and wallflowers were also grown. Their good neighbours, the Manns, ran the greengrocers on Broomfield parade, which is where a lot of Michael's produce found a market. Tomatoes were sold as 'local' toms' or if you were in the know you could ask for Michael's tomatoes. Once a confused customer asked for 'St Michaels tomatoes' – never did he have a higher accolade!

Michael married Greta at Broomfield church in October 1963 and Keith was born the following year while I came along in 1972. A lot of our time was spent mooching around the market garden, occasionally helping with jobs. In the growing season when the lettuces were in full flow the whole family, including cousins and neighbours would be brought in to help with the bagging and boxing. Often we would sit in the shade of the big Early Rivers plum tree and as a treat a bottle of cherryade would be bought from the Co-Op.

The 1980s were tough for small growers, supermarkets were coming on stream and local greengrocers were losing out so it was a great relief to Michael that he was able to sell some of his beloved 'Ground' in the late 1980s. However, he did keep a good sized garden so for over 25 years he was able to enjoy carrying on gardening on quite a scale. Later on he was "assisted" in the garden by his grandchildren, Thomas and Chloe.

On Thursday 28th June 2018 Broomfield St Mary's was the setting for Michael's funeral. The church, where he had in turn been baptized and married, was filled with his family and friends and the first hymn was appropriately 'We plough the fields and scatter'. Afterwards Michael was laid to rest in the churchyard, overlooking the fields of Broomfield Hall, just up from his best friend Colin Middleditch and opposite his parents. During the service I recounted some words from Broomfield farmer David Smith's 1948 book The Same Sky Over All:

'A man gets his roots in the soil and the soil holds him.

As Kipling put it:

God gave all men all earth to love But, since our hearts are small, Ordained for each one spot should prove Beloved over all'

For Michael that spot was Broomfield and his beloved garden.
