As a Council we **communicate** though this magazine (which receives constant praise), our notice boards, our website and a Facebook page which is informative rather than responsive.

It is the final point which is interesting. Your Council gets regular mention on social media platforms, generally critical and ill informed. Our current policy is not to respond but I confess it is not always easy to hold back!

It has been suggested in the past that we should actively engage through social media. The last time it was raised formally it was rejected by Council due to a certain fear of the unknown, but also due to the workload as it needs constant attention through the office. Although we might be the lowest level of government we are still a representative body of the electorate and any statements made must be factual, accurate and measured. For that reason it is our policy that all official communication goes through the office.

We plan to debate social media at a future Council meeting and would very much appreciate the input of an expert on the subject. If somebody in the Village is prepared to give the benefit of some guidance it would be very much appreciated. Please contact me for a chat if you think you might be able to help. 
What else is happening?

At the Village Hall the new public car park is finished and by publication of this magazine the Adventure Cycleway should also be complete. I hope it will become a regularly used facility for children and young people to play and exercise, for new cyclists to learn the rules of the road and parents to teach their child how to cycle in a safe environment. There are not many facilities like this in Chelmsford so we are hoping that visitors will come to Broomfield from all over town. The original idea for the Cycleway came for feedback from Villagers that we needed more facilities for young people. It has been a long time coming but I hope it will be appreciated. A working party led by Cllr Wendy Daden is

A working party led by Cllr Wendy Daden is looking at how the community might use the land behind Broomfield Place if Essex County Council would agree to a proportion of it being made available for community use. The working party organised an open day in May which some parishioners did attend but a greater interest in what we are doing would always make such events more valuable. Options are being assessed and we are talking to ECC, through Cllr John Aldridge. Work continues so if anybody is interested or thinks they might be able to add value please contact **wendy.bpcwendy@gmail.com**. Later in this edition members of the working party have set out their own ideas that you might find interesting and a questionnaire to help inform our discussions with Essex County Council.

ECC's consultation on possible library closures has now been concluded and a press statement has been made confirming that all Essex Libraries are to remain open. This may be seen as a victory by many but we do have to read the press release carefully. ECC talk about "communities offering to run the service". "all Essex libraries will stay open during the future strategy we are drawing up" and "a large number of local groups wish to run their library and turn it much more into a local community centre" It is just my interpretation but I read the press release as saying ECC will help and support but they expect the local communities, around the smaller libraries, to take an active part in the operation and support of their facilities. I do not think we can be complacent that the status guo will just continue unchallenged. In Broomfield we must accept that in terms of book lending our library is the least used facility in Essex. Put crudely there must be a case of use it or lose it.

As a Parish Council we are planning a focus group meeting to explore what steps we can take to improve the use of our library. Once we have developed a draft strategy the next step will be to look for help from the villagers to fine tune the detail and put a plan in place. That will involve active levels of volunteers to come forward and get involved. The Parish Council and the Library team simply do not have the resources to do more than is currently being done themselves. So again if you think you can help in any way in developing a strategy to keep our library open then please get in touch with me through the office. John Barnes

Defibrillator installed at Broomfield Village Hall

Broomfield Parish Council have installed a Defibrillator on the outside wall of Broomfield Village Hall.

It is now connected to the emergency services, so anyone who needs it can call **999** and will be told what to do. The Council is particularly grateful to Rebecca O'Mahony who has been very generous in her expertise and time in making this possible. We are even more grateful that she will be offering training in how to use the defibrillator this autumn. The training will be in the Village Hall and everyone will be welcome.

If you think that someone is having a cardiac arrest, the first thing to do is call **999**. If the emergency services think that the defibrillator is needed, they you will be told where to go and how to get to the equipment.

Everything will be explained to you, and the defibrillator will only administer a shock if it is the right thing to do.




You do not have to do anything other than follow the instructions. We really hope that it is never needed, but if it is, you know where to find it.

Libraries to stay open

I am pleased to confirm that all Essex Libraries are to remain open after just over 20,000 people responded to the consultation revealing a renewed enthusiasm for

the library service. The new service strategy proposes a future for every single library in Essex and also commits that no libraries will close in the next five years. The strategy focuses on developing an investment plan to improve libraries and work with community groups or other organisations to set up community run libraries, with the aim of ensuring a library service is retained in every current location, and potentially established in three or more new locations. A £3m investment programme for library services will be introduced to include grant funding of £18k over three years, an initial donation of books, refresh of reading materials and support to community-run library groups to train volunteers.

After scrutiny by Place Services and Economic Growth Policy Committee this the package will be agreed by the ECC Cabinet.

Footway Repairs

During the coming months Essex Highways will focus on the repair of pavements.

On receipt of the most pressing cases Highways will carry out the necessary repairs alongside more routine work. County Councillors have been asked to prioritise up to five defects in their area. I have received, as you would expect, quite a number of footway defects which are now being processed by Highways for prompt action.

I am very excited about my new role as your Chelmsford City Councillor and thank you for this opportunity. Listening to the

passion each officer has for their department is inspiring. Most impressively, with 252,000 refuse collections each and every week our team only missed one day in 2018 due to snow! CCC recycle the majority of our waste, burning the rest for energy. Whilst keeping the oceans plastic free it is not perfect for reducing our carbon footprint; using less plastic is really the way forward.

CCC have pledged to reduce its own carbon emission to net zero by 2030 declaring a Climate Emergency. The announcement at full council opened the door nicely for me to request prioritising the cycle and footpaths to link Broomfield Hospital (Chelmsford's biggest employer) and the City Centre.

The local plan was reviewed by the new administration but any major amendment would make it subject to the more recent 2019 government policy, meaning more housing for Chelmsford! Minor amendments are currently part of the public consultation with the plan due to be adopted towards the end of the year.

Chelmsford Museum has reopened after £1.44 million investment from the Heritage lottery fund and is well worth a visit, if only to view a working hive. Many of you will have enjoyed the new Riverside Leisure Centre this summer. As well as all the usual facilities the café overlooks both the river and swimmers – the location and menu designed to make it an attractive venue in its own right.

Scruffy areas can easily be tidied up with some colourful planting to enhance the area. We are also hoping that the takeaway restaurants will let us replant or replace their plant tubs. Wild plant seeds will be scattered in appropriate areas.

Permission is being sought from Highways to install a bus shelter at Erick Avenue, near to Felsted Field and quotes are also being tendered to replace the surface in the playground adjacent to the village hall.



Do you work from home?

In 2017, the Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire suggested that nearly half of Broomfieldians carry out paid work from home, either regularly (19%) or occasionally (29%).

The rise in working from home is probably due to several different factors, for instance:

- Employers introducing hot-desking and home working to save on office accommodation costs
- Employees wanting a better work/life balance, with less time spent commuting
- Mobile staff who cover an area that is closer to home than the office
- People starting their own small businesses that won't ever need a separate work base
- People starting small businesses that will one day need separate small premises if the business is to grow and flourish.

Another benefit of home working to the wider community is that it should lead to less traffic, especially at peak times. That's a good reason for the Broomfield Neighbourhood Plan to encourage home working, as well as the benefit to businesses and local workers who want to do it.

Neighbourhood plans are all about local communities shaping new development over the next 20 years or so. Plans can potentially make specific requirements for new developments to meet local circumstances and needs. So, we're thinking about how our Plan could help people who work from home. Here are some very basic ideas that we've had so far:

- Should our Plan encourage developers to include office-sized rooms in new homes, in addition to normal domestic rooms?
- Are there sufficient small office/workshop spaces in our area, so that new businesses starting in someone's home can move without undue difficulty into a larger space once they outgrow the home?

- Should significant new housing developments contain a communal Work Hub, so that home-based workers can:
 - have access to small meeting rooms
 - benefit from shared technology that might be too expensive for a new start-up to afford on its own
 - share a networking space to help relieve the sense of isolation that some home workers can experience
 - rent a work space if, for instance, the home contains other commitments that are hard to get away from (e.g. children!).

These are just initial ideas. We only want to pursue them if they're going to be of some use to Broomfield residents and businesses. Equally, are there other ideas that we haven't thought of?

So please tell us if you have any thoughts or comments about working from home. For instance:

- If you work from home now, what are the joys and challenges?
- If you've worked at home in the past but had to go back to a formal office/work environment, why was that?
- Would you like to work at home, if certain conditions could be met?
- If you've started a small business at home that will eventually outgrow your home, what would help you when you get to that stage?
- If you're an established local business, would you like to promote home working for your staff? If so, what might help?
- Or, if you're a small local business, are you being held back by any premises-related issues?



Every year, the Parish Council has to complete an annual return that explains where the money has come from and gone to. This has to be presented in a standard format, and here it is.

And the £105,000 difference is the amount by which the reserve has gone up.

Once again, I am pleased to report that the council continues to keep itself in the black while managing to improve the services we offer. I am also pleased to report that we have done this by holding the average precept at ± 54 for the third year running. As you can see from the numbers, the amount of money raised by the precept has gone up, but this is because there are more houses contributing. The amount you pay stays the same.

Last year, the council was successful in getting an £8,000 grant from Essex County Council, and you can visit the parish play area to see how this has improved the kicking wall in Angel Field. There have also been grants provided to help offset the money spent on the neighbourhood plan. In case you were wondering, the Council has not made a profit from the neighbourhood plan.

The grant money has paid for most of the work, but Broomfield has collaborated with neighbouring parishes on a joint response and the costs have been shared proportionally – sometimes the money gets spent in one year and recovered in the next, so it looks like we have done better out of it than we had.

Don't forget that grants can flow both ways and one of the things the Parish Council can do for you is support your organisation with a grant. It is disappointing to see that very few organisations have taken advantage of this. Events like Play in the Park and the Seniors Luncheon also received support from the Parish, but it would be good to see some new organisations coming forward for grants. The council has invested a significant amount in planning matters like responding to the Local Plan and developing the Neighbourhood Plan. The Council wanted to make a strong case that stood-up to scrutiny, so professional support was needed. I think you will agree that the amount of housing allocated to the parish is much more reasonable now.

At a more practical level, the council funds or supports Play in the Park activities, litter picks, allotments, Centenary Wood, tree maintenance, grass cutting in the recreation grounds and village greens and even a few festive lights in the telephone booth.

You may be pleased to see that the Council has received a significant amount of money from the levy that is imposed on new housing developments. Elsewhere in this magazine, you will find some questions about how this should be spent but in the meanwhile, some has already gone towards improved parking and a new cycleway around the fields.

A summary of the unaudited accounts for the year ended 31st March 2018 is shown on the charts and a copy of the Audited Accounts will be available from the Parish Office once the Audit has been completed. If you have any questions about the Accounts please direct these to the Clerk at the Parish Office who will provide any further information you may request.

Broomfield Place (land) Special Strengthening and sustaining our community

Broomfield Place is the name for the six acres of land behind the fish and chip shop and Indian takeaway. It is important to remember that this land is owned by Essex County Council, and theirs is the final say on what happens, but the Parish Council is keen to see it used to benefit the Community and to stimulate thought and discussion, they have commissioned some articles by people with an interest in making use of the land at Broomfield Place. Not all of these articles represent the views of the Council, and some are more personal than others. Read them, form your own opinions and let us know in the questionnaire.

Currently it is mostly wild grassland, with some woodland and a 72 place car park on the eastern side near Main Road. The land was going to form part of a wider housing development with a new primary school, but that idea was dropped last year. That means it should be safe from development at least until 2036, when the next Chelmsford Local Plan will be drawn up and there is a call for sites.

It's now been suggested the land could be used for community facilities instead. Broomfield Parish Council wants to know your views. We held an Open Day in May to discuss ideas about how the land might be used for community facilities. The Open Day was attended by 32 local residents and some others.

Now the Parish Council want to hear from a larger number of residents to justify approaching the landowner.

Could Broomfield Place Become a Local Nature Reserve?

Local authorities can create local nature reserves (LNRs). The local authority must control the LNR land - either through ownership, a lease or an agreement with the owner. As a manager of an LNR you need to care for and protect its natural features. You must also make your land accessible for any visitors including the public, although you are allowed to restrict certain areas.

There are 49 local nature reserves in Essex. These range in size from 1.2 acres to 2678 acres. A local example is the Chelmer Valley Riverside LNR comprising 43 acres along the east bank of the River Chelmer from the Valley Bridge to Victoria Road. The illustrations on display are from this reserve showing features and examples of volunteer groups at work.

We could involve:

- · 'friends of' community groups
- wildlife trusts and other recognised conservation bodies
- site-based rangers
- local school children-Broomfield School- forest schools? The scouts- for camping/ tracking, community assistance/ wildlife study?
- Natural England (who can give advice)



Byelaws

Local authorities and town and parish councils can create LNR byelaws to govern the reserve.

Advantages The site would be protected for a period- the minimum period granted is 21 years.

Hopefully we could then argue for it to be kept. It would give opportunities to create a beautiful environment and space for wildlife in a heavily developed Broomfield, with scope for the community to come together for volunteering and providing a new and exciting facility to be used by the school, the scouts and other groups.

An early years autistic centre

An early years autistic centre provides therapy to help autistic 2-5 year olds develop communication skills beyond verbal. It would provide a limited number of places per session due to the practicality of providing one-to-one support.

I am proposing that such a centre be included at Broomfield Place, as it will be of great benefit to Broomfield as a stand-alone facility or part of the training centre. I am asking you to tick this option in question one of the questionnaire because:



A Doctors' Purpose-Built Surgery – Broomfield Place My vision ...

Looking into the future of Broomfield where development is rapidly increasing and no doubt will continue to do so, my vision is for a state-of-the-art doctors' surgery. The facility would include at least 9 consulting rooms, 2 large treatment rooms, 2 nurses' rooms and toilets all on the ground floor. There would be room for administration including work stations and wireless technology situated on the first floor with a kitchen and rest room for staff. This would be a magnet to attract GPs into Broomfield Place especially with ample parking already in situ.

Development companies currently looking to build in Broomfield (as per the emerging Local Plan) may be willing to either build the surgery or contribute financially. Including a pharmacy may be another option with a pharmaceutical company making a contribution.

In the first instance we need to know whether this is something Broomfield residents need, bearing in mind that the surgery would also attract patients from outside Broomfield so bringing more traffic into the area. However ECC has stipulated that the land must be used for the benefit of residents in surrounding areas, so a doctors' surgery would fit their criteria. *Sue Hubble*

What is An Aimshouse?



An almshouse is a unit of residential accommodation which belongs to a charity. Today the almshouse movement has developed into something vibrant and relevant that continues to provide a strong sense of community. Each almshouse can forever belong to a charitable trust, as there is no right to buy, so this is a wonderful and safe way to provide affordable accommodation for the people of Broomfield.

The criteria as to who is eligible to live in an almshouse is set out by the founder. This could be BPC, influencing the shape of our community and the charities job is to fulfil this purpose. Would you accept a few alms houses if they were aimed at existing elderly residents? NHS staff? Students whilst preparing for life at the work training centre? www.almshouses.org

How to Stop Mass Development on Broomfield Place

Broomfield Place belongs to Essex County Council (ECC). They've said they don't need it to fulfil their functions and have declared it surplus to requirements. Normally this means they would sell it for the highest price possible. Last year, they tried to sell it all for residential development but, thanks to the Parish Council and County Councillor John Aldridge, we put a stop to that.

As a cash-strapped local authority, ECC can't afford to just give the land to Broomfield Parish Council. The Parish Council can't afford to buy it because it has 'hope value', meaning it's worth a lot more than ordinary grassland because it may be potential building land one day.

That's a shame, because the ideal way to keep Broomfield Place green and unspoilt would be to buy it and turn it into a nature reserve, country park, sports fields or the like. Obviously, any community facilities that need buildings, structures etc. wouldn't help to keep Broomfield Place green and open – quite the opposite.

Fortunately, there is another way. The planning system has introduced 'neighbourhood plans', which are led by a parish or local community. We're working on the Broomfield Neighbourhood Plan now. One of the things we're looking at is how we can protect as much of our beautiful countryside and green space as possible, using the additional scope we get by doing a neighbourhood plan.

When we consult on the draft Plan in early 2020, you can see what we've been able to achieve and tell us what you think of it – plus you get a vote on it at the end of the process. When our Neighbourhood Plan runs out in 2036, assuming the planning system is broadly the same as now, we can do another one and carry on.

Personally I'd like to protect as much of Broomfield Place as possible, but that's only my view. Please say in Question 2 what you think – tell us how much of the land should be protected as green space.

Community Facilities

It's suggested that a lot of community facilities could be sited on Broomfield Place. Personally, I think there is only room for a small number if they need buildings. Otherwise you start to eat into the green space too much and encroach on the setting of Broomfield Place, a lovely historic building. If new facilities don't need buildings (e.g. a nature reserve), it's a different matter of course.

But that's only my view. The key thing is that any community facilities - GP surgery, early years facility, nature reserve, work training centre, etc. – must be what local Broomfield people want. Please say in Question 1 what facilities you do want (if any) by ticking those in the list or adding more.

How would Community Facilities be paid for?

Finally, do remember that there are no magic money trees in Broomfield. If you find one, please let me know first! Everything has to be paid for somehow. There may be grants for some sorts of community facility, but the first question is:

How do we pay for the land?

The normal thing is that landowners offer to give some land, provided they can build private houses or commercial development on the rest. As a Parish Council, we've always opposed any residential/commercial development in Broomfield Place, unless ECC agrees to build the long-promised new primary school.

I don't want anyone to wake up in 20 years and find that the green space has unexpectedly all gone – either underneath community buildings or private housing needed to pay for them – unless that's what local people specifically want. If you really are happy for housing/commercial development on some of the land to finance the facilities, you need to tell us – parish councillors are here to do what you want as far as we can. But you need to make it clear when you answer Question 3. Otherwise our current position is to oppose it.

So, it's up to you the people of Broomfield to tell us what you want to happen at Broomfield Place. Whatever you decide, my personal hope is that there'll still be lots of beautiful countryside in Broomfield for our children and grand-children to enjoy in years to come.



Broomfield's German Adventure

On a sunny Spring morning in 1957, a company of young men (aged 17 to 19 years old) gathered together at the YMCA in School Lane Broomfield, (an old Quaker School which was made available through the kindness of Mrs Nora Marriage).

Armed with their kit bags, they were preparing to leave this green and pleasant land. Their transport arrived and they clambered aboard. Their destination was Harwich and from there via ferry to the Hook of Holland.

Having boarded the ferry and stowed their kit they relaxed and settled down with a drink or two. Their excitement could be felt. Arriving at the Hook, they boarded a train to Germany.

As they rattled through the beautiful Dutch countryside their excitement grew. Arriving at Wesel (North Germany), Broomfield YMCA football team had arrived for their tour.

We were met by members of the Friedrichsfeld Sports Club, who supplied transport to the village.

As this was the 'British Zone', a British Army Officer was on hand to help with translation.

We were welcomed, and after being fed on green pea soup, were allocated to various host families for the duration of the tour.

We had a four Club fixture list: Friedrichsfeld. Wesel, and two others (now lost in the mists of time). Our Wesel game was one we remembered.

At the start, it was World War 3, we were playing for our Dads, and they were playing for their Dads, t'was a bit violent! However two German policemen who were watching the game, came into the changing rooms at half time, and gave us all a real telling off.

They told us the whole point of these sort of sporting fixtures is to make sure we never fight another war. The second half was much better.

We were also taken by coach to visit places they thought would interest us, including a completely destroyed factory, which they told us British Bombers had done. We also enjoyed some great social occasions in the Village, which involved drinking vast amounts of Schnapps. There was also fine accommodation, the Ulrich Hotel, where we met the locals including those our own age.

Those of us on the tour weren't all Broomfield lads; we were a mixed bag, one from Great Waltham and two from Galleywood. The whole event was organised by Leslie Orrin (a YMCA member) who lived in Ridley Road, a family name well known in the village.

Overall it was a great success and I for one really enjoyed the experience. Friedrichsfeld visited Broomfield in 1958 – does anyone remember that?

Broomfield's Princely Saxon burial

Gravel extraction has taken place over the centuries and increased in the latter part of the 19th century, later reaching industrial proportions with the growing demands of road and building construction.



In 1888, workmen digging gravel at Broomfield (Clobb's Row, behind the commemorated Saxon Wav) found an iron sword, in fragments, some smaller iron objects and three small pieces of high-quality gold jewellery. The owner of the land, Mr. David Christie declared

the objects to the British Museum and subsequently excavation took place in 1894. During this excavation the grave was completely exposed and artefacts extracted included a bronze bowl, two blue glass jars, textiles and a wheel thrown pot.

During the first excavation in 1888 part of the gold buckle appears to have been smuggled from the site and it was reported in 1894 to have been in the possession of a young lady, but sadly has not been seen or heard of since.

Hercules Read of the British Museum reported in his diary account of the 1894 excavation that" there was good deal of very dark matter, charcoal, fragments of wood and parts of flat iron bars and angle irons with rivets through them. No traces of bones were met with, either burnt or unburnt." Under the acid conditions found at this site the disappearance of organic matter, such as the body is not unexpected.

It is suggested by the British Museum (1994 interpretation) that the body lay on a wooden platform or crude bed. The bronze bowl and textile pad were placed by the left shoulder and the shield propped up against the east wall. The spear was placed in the north sector and the jewellery, sword and knife beside the right side of the body. Two buckets and a lamp (an almost identical type of lamp was found at the Royal burial ground at Sutton Hoo in Suffolk) were placed beside the sword and knife and jewellery with a cauldron to the west. The

collection of drinking vessels, two glass jars, two wooden cups and probably both horns were assembled in the bronze bowl.

We do not know who was buried at Broomfield, but the archaeological evidence suggests a 7th century burial of a person of wealth and high socia1 standing, possibly linked to the royal house of Kent.

The blue glass jars, pottery and jewellery are related to finds in Kent and the bronze bowl has its probable



Recent work at Broomfield has provided some evidence for an early Saxon settlement not far from the rich 7th century burial. In July 1985 the site was threatened by gravel extraction (history repeating its self!) and an excavation produced flint work, scattered Saxon pottery and pits containing charcoal, bones, daub and early Saxon pottery.

A few of the finds from the Broomfield Anglo Saxon burial are currently on display in the British Museum, but here is the exciting part ... several objects have been borrowed from the British Museum and now feature in the new display in the Chelmsford Museum in Oaklands Park, which opened at the end of July.

Plus the next People & Stone event at St Mary's Church on Saturday 28th September, will feature a talk by Ken Crowe, formerly of Southend Museum, who has just published the records of the Prittlewell Burial of similar age. His talk will compare the finds there with those from Broomfield, shedding light on their interpretation using more modern methods and understanding.

Most of this information was originally reported by Ken Searles in issue 2 of Broomfield Times.

Channels Residents Community Group

The Channels Development continues to grow at a pace with the Croudace phase complete, Bellway phases now almost complete and the Home Group phase well underway with first residents beginning to move in.

Marden Homes have also started construction on dwellings that are to be built around the large lake to the side of Channels Drive with work expected to continue for circa 18 months. Residents of Channels currently sit in both Broomfield and Little Waltham parishes and the the majority of new properties now being built will fall under Little Waltham. Currently the Bellway at Channels phase sits within the Broomfield Parish.

The Channels Residents Community Group is working with the landowner and their agent to develop public open spaces that have to be provided as part of planning conditions and residents have submitted a number of ideas which are being taken into consideration.

These ideas (which still need to be fully worked up and agreed) include outdoor fitness equipment, community growing points, enclosed dog exercise areas and sensory gardens. Construction of the public open spaces is planned to start within the next couple of months. Ultimately there will be some lovely open spaces for use by residents of Channels and those of surrounding areas.

There are a number of ongoing issues including the need for a crossing on Essex Regiment Way to facilitate safe passage off of the Channels Development and consideration of planning submissions which may adversely impact on the area due to the lack of infrastructure. There have also been significant issues with the 51 Bus Service. However with continued pressure from the Channels Residents Community Group, and the support of local councillors, there has been an improvement in the reliability of the bus service. There will also be a revised timetable from September which addresses concerns in relation to frequency and timing at key periods during the day. It shows that residents do have a voice!

There is now an active Neighbourhood Watch on the Bellway phase of the development and it is hoped that residents from the other phases follow suit as it provides a more formalised way to inform the Police of any suspicious activity. The Watch Groups have frequent contact with their local policing teams meaning that crime alerts can be quickly circulated. The regular flow of information raises awareness, helps make members more aware of local crime problems and provides the opportunity to prevent members from being victims of crime.

Neighbourhood Watch is a free, confidential service and it is up to residents how involved they want to be. However it also assists in establishing a community spirit so that everyone can contribute to the well-being of the neighbourhood by mutual co-operation.
