#### Chairman's Chat



The last few months have not been easy for anybody, if you have lost a friend or loved one then everybody at Broomfield Parish Council sends you their deepest condolences.

The Village Hall and the children's play park has been closed but is now starting to reopen. Our Staff have continued to work throughout lockdown. The Office Staff have worked from home and come in on a strict rota. The Village Hall Caretaker and Village Attendant have worked on decorating and maintaining the Hall, allotments and public areas under our responsibility.

On behalf of the Village I would like to thank them all for their diligent contribution. We must also recognise that we have a major hospital facility, two schools, 3 care facilities and a hospice in the village. The staff of which have all continued to work treating patients, teaching our children and caring for those that need care.

We would like to thank them all for their efforts which we all greatly appreciate. I know there are many others who have continued to work in the village and beyond who I have not mentioned, they too should be thanked.

As a Council we are considering how we might permanently recognise the efforts of so many during this pandemic. I have written to the hospital, schools, care homes and hospice asking them if they have any ideas of how we might record our thanks, I hope we will receive some positive ideas. I have also asked the schools if the children themselves might like to be involved in designing or building some form of tribute.

Ideas from villagers would be very welcome so please do get in touch if you can think of anything suitable.

Work in the Parish does go on, as I mentioned above, we have thoroughly cleaned the Village Hall and maintenance and decoration has been carried out where appropriate.

We want to refurbish the children's play park by the Village Hall and probably introduce some new items of equipment. A budget for the work was agreed at our June meeting. Bringing in advisors during lockdown has not been easy but we are at last gathering together proposals to complete this work which we hope will be done very soon.

At the allotment site we have cleared away some rubbish that had accumulated and two old plots have been cleared ready for letting, if you are interested please contact Wendy Martin at the office.

Sadly, we have had to give some allotment holders notice because they are not tending their plots. These will be cleared ready to be let.

We were very lucky to have been able to secure advice from Mark Lane the BBC Gardeners World presenter on how we might set up raised beds to be used by allotment holders who can no longer tend a full plot and might also be used by less mobile people. He has given us a great deal of help with ideas of how we would make such a plot full accessible.

We do not want to something that will not be used, so while we carry out some more market research, we are going ahead with building two plots as a pilot scheme. We already have people lined up to use these. We are also investigating building a compost toilet block and introducing water harvesting. If you know of anybody who would be interested in using a raised bed, or a charitable organisation that may have beneficiaries who could use such a facility please do get in touch with us.

At out June Council meeting we approved a grant to the Broomfield Scout Group to go towards their hut redevelopment and building of a climbing wall.

We also agreed an exciting new scheme to recognise babies born to Broomfield Villagers. Cllr Angie Faulds has been working on this scheme and I am very pleased that the Council has supported her.

The basic idea is that we will offer the parents of babies born in Broomfield the option of having a fruit tree planted in their garden or in a public space around the village to mark their child's birth.

We still need to formulate the details but to get the scheme off the ground we are looking for parents of children born this year to come forward to put together an initial batch of trees that we can plant. If you have had a child, or know of somebody who has, who you think would be interested in having their child's birth marked in this way can you please get in touch with the Village Hall office, details below.

Finally, to keep everybody up to date we are looking at whether it would be possible to extend the Village Hall to accommodate more space for you to use, and to cope with greater social distancing in the future. We are looking at what we might do to improve the conservation area around Church Green and finally, some residents have had an idea about building a facility for a Youth Club in the Village. It is only an idea at the moment, and it is in the very early stages of development but it could be possible.

# The Channels Development Scheme

The Channels development is rapidly growing and is currently split across two Parish Councils, Broomfield and Little Waltham.

The Bellway Homes development (Eagle Rise & Aqua Verde) comprising Brassie Wood, Fairway Drive, Jigger Gardens, Mashie Link and Niblick Green all fall within the Parish of Broomfield. A small number of properties in Birdie Close on the Croudace part of the development also fall within the Parish of Broomfield.

The part of the Channels development that sits within the Broomfield Parish is now very well established although it will grow over the next 12 months as Marden Homes continues with Phase 4 ('The Lakes') which will see properties built around the large lake bordering Essex Regiment Way and Channels Drive.

The Channels Residents Community Group now covers and represents the entire Channels development and there is no doubt it gives us a strong voice. We worked hard to have the bridleway that runs alongside the Southern border of Eagle Rise (down to Essex Regiment Way and on to Broomfield) improved as it was almost impassable by foot when wet and as a result a new 'self-bind' surface was laid during March so as to avoid any excessive surface water build up. In addition, and after the issue being raised many times, we received confirmation that the much needed crossing at the bottom of the same bridleway, to facilitate safe passage across Essex Regiment Way and into Broomfield, was to be completed during the 2020/21 financial year. This may now slip due to the impact of COVID19.

The focus for the residents that sit within the Broomfield Parish has now shifted towards community building and finding ways to enhance and enrich the development.




The Community Group Mission Statement is: "To develop and maintain an all-inclusive, healthy and vibrant community through involvement with residents who want to address local issues or common concerns and to make a positive difference to where they live."

We have worked with Broomfield Parish Council over the last year to begin the process of turning what was merely houses on a plot of land into a neighbourhood with a community feel. Simple things can make a huge difference and Broomfield Parish Council assisted with the installation of a combined refuse & cigarette bin at the bus shelter together with noticeboards in the bus shelter to give residents an insight into what is happening across the parish. More recently, the Parish Council has assisted with funding two new dog waste bins in areas that border Bridleway 18 (which will be of benefit to everyone) and also with funding for a large community notice board that will be used by the Community Group to pass on information specific to the Channels development.

Work is also progressing well on development of communal open spaces (required as part of planning consent) which will see parkland areas made accessible including facilities such as a skate park and children's play area. These will of course be open to all!

The Community Group looks forward to working with Broomfield Parish Council over the coming months to progress its core aims with a specific focus on social unity and safety.



#### Now & Then....

In Broomfield the village blacksmith plied his trade where business was likely to be most brisk, alongside Main Road.

This photograph can be confidently dated to 1910 for one of the posters advertises the County Sports which were to be held in Chelmsford on 16th July of that year. Mr Chandler, on the left was then the blacksmith assisted by Mr Sewell. The shop still stands. though now hardly recognizable; for a long time, it was Barnard's hardware shop and since then has had several changes of business'. (taken from 'Broomfield in old picture postcards' by Ken Searles)



'The dawn of a new era; the arrival of the motor car changed the appearance of Broomfield, Roads were coated with tarred chippings, a welcome change from mud and potholes (!!) and the village got its first garage, A directory of 1927-28 lists Joseph Day as a motor engineer in Broomfield.



His garage until recently flourished on the same site although it now looks very different to this photograph taken in the 1930s.

Another lost feature of Broomfield can be seen between the garage and the houses on the right – the header tank at the pumping station which then supplied Broomfield's water: it was closed and dismantled in the 1940's to the dismay of many Broomfieldians who preferred their local water to 'furrin stuff' pumped in from outside the Village' taken from 'Broomfield in old pictures postcards' by Ken Searles.

Thanks to our Village Attendant Stuart Jones for his work on these images.

## Report from City Councillor Wendy Daden July 2020

All council meetings are now online via Microsoft teams and can be joined via the City Council website

The Local Plan was adopted in May – Chelmsford planners will now be obliged to

grant permission to all sites included in that document. The City Council has prioritised cycling, walking over cars - they have an accreditation scheme to improve new developments in line with nature and good design. Master planning for 450 Bloor Homes on Blasford Hill is in progress - with building expected early next year.

Chelmsford City Council have a Movement Around the City working group (MAC) with County Council and City Council Members and Officers working together – their focus being to reduce pollution and traffic congestion. MAC Officers have calculated that if everybody works from home just two days a week we could remove 160.000 cars from Chelmsford roads Essex County Council are also looking to encourage people to work locally by offering sound proof workspaces in soundproof pods in libraries. This will help to resolve problems where multiple adults are working from the same house and avoid distraction from noisy dogs and children

A Park and Peddle scheme (with parking at the Park & Ride car parks) to encourage cycling is being considered - I have obviously pushed for the scheme to include Broomfield Hospital with safe cycle paths to link the two sites. There is also Improvement for the cycling and walkways around the City, you will see more secure cycle storage introduced into the City Centre. Riverside Leisure Centre Petition – this was reviewed but sadly there is no change for 14-15 year olds not being chaperoned in the gym after 5.30pm. However, I have made the suggestion teenagers are allowed to apply for this and under special circumstances this will be allowed. It will be reviewed next time. Chelmsford High street has reopened with a stay left policy and Street Ambassadors to answer questions

**Member of Parliament** Report

I've received many letters from parents across the constituency, including **Broomfield about schools** opening.

The past few months have been a challenge for all of us who

have children of school age and I'm particularly concerned about children and young people falling behind in their studies.

I had a meeting with Heather Shelley, Headteacher at Broomfield Primary School to raise this issue and to learn more about how teachers and pupils locally have been managing since the partial reopening of schools with social distancing.

Given the school has been undergoing construction work, this, on top of the limited classroom space available, understandably has proved challenging for the school as they've tried to maintain social distancing measures amongst the children.

Mrs Shelley explained how pleased they were to have some of their pupils back with them whilst recognising the difficulties for those parents who have been unable to send their children back and how difficult it has been not seeing them all return. We discussed how well prepared the children were, ensuring they maintained their distance from their friends and stay within their 'bubbles'.

I share the view of many of you, that it is critical to get schools open and as close to normal as soon as possible. I also understand the representations made by teaching staff about the many factors that must be considered prior to the Government's decision to re-open schools to all year groups, including the health and safety of children, the effects associated with the closures and whether schools have the capacity to ask all pupils to return while maintaining social distancing.

I would like to thank Mrs Shellev and her colleagues for the time and effort that has been put in to ensure the pupils that could return could do so safely, as well as the parent's body and parents locally that have been so supportive of the school during these difficult times.

I will be raising her concerns, and those of other local Headteachers and parents with the Government as we continue to work on the further easing of restrictions. If residents would like to highlight any further matters, you can email me at:

## **Planning news**

#### **Planning Applications:**

The Parish Council is consulted about every Broomfield planning application. The Planning Committee responds on behalf of the Parish. Though the Committee hasn't been able to meet physically during the lockdown, they have been viewing planning applications electronically and passing on their comments to the Clerk. So please rest assured we're continuing this important work despite the lockdown! A local parish perspective is still being given to the City Council about every Broomfield planning application it receives.

So far this year, the Planning Committee considered over 50 planning applications. If you want to tell us your views about any planning application or indeed any other planning matter in the Village, please either email: planning@broomfieldessex.co.uk or phone (01245) 441660 (answer machine which is checked regularly). Any comments or concerns will be passed onto the Planning Committee for their consideration. Also, don't forget you can comment directly to the City Council as well – please go to their website for further details:

Once we get back to 'normal', you'll be able to attend a Planning Committee Meeting if you'd like to tell the Committee your concerns face-to-face. Meetings take place on the first Wednesday of each month in the Parish Office, Broomfield Village Hall at 7.30 pm.

#### Village Gateway:

You'll be familiar with the Village Gateway as you enter Broomfield from Chelmsford. The aim of village gateways is raise awareness of village identity. This is nice for our community anyway, but specifically the aim is to encourage drivers to moderate their speed as they go through the village (any maybe, possibly, to even think about using the A130 bypass instead of coming through the village!).

We have been liaising with Essex Highways about installing a northern Gateway to the Village (near the Hospital Approach roundabout). We now have both the funding (from Highways) and a mutually agreeable location. We're now just waiting for it to be installed.

#### **Neighbourhood Plan Update:**

Meanwhile, work is continuing on the Broomfield Neighbourhood Plan. Once it is finished, examined by an Inspector and approved by local residents in a referendum, this will be like a local plan for Broomfield. Inevitably, the lockdown has slowed things down as we can't, for instance, hold meetings or consultation events. However, we are able to do some work behind the scenes. So, we are starting to draft the policies that will go into the Plan. These are based on what local residents have told us about what they want to protect and what they would like to change. All these policies have to broadly conform with the Chelmsford Local Plan (see above) and national planning regulations. Once the lockdown is over, we'll be able to publish the draft policies and consult local residents about them. How we do this will partly depend on social distancing rules at the time.

So, watch this space for further updates. We've also had to move our website on to the Parish Council website – see:

We're still working on the transfer at the moment, so please bear with us for a couple more weeks until it is fully operational.

#### **Proposed Cycle Path through Broomfield:**

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has put a lot of work into new cycle routes, which we hope will be included in the Neighbourhood Plan. That's because residents told us (in the Questionnaire) that they would like to see safe cycle paths and would use them if they felt secure. That's one way of reducing the impact of traffic, which residents say is their only major dislike about living in Broomfield.

Essex Highways has already approved a cycle path from Great Waltham, past the Hospital and Chelmer Valley High School, down to School Lane. So, the Group's main focus has been how to link this path with the existing cycle path behind the Avenues, so that Broomfield residents, Hospital staff and others can cycle safely into the City Centre.

It's far from simple, as there isn't enough land along the full length of Main Road for a completely separate cycle path; and other possible routes involve crossing private land. However, we've persuaded Essex Highways to complete the second stage of a feasibility study. This should show exactly what the specific problems are, so that we can look for ways of overcoming them.



#### Chelmsford's New Local Plan



#### In May, the City Council finally adopted its new Local Plan.

This controls where new development – houses, roads, shops and other facilities – will go between now and 2036. It's taken 6 years to get there!

For most of that time, the threat of

mass development has been hanging over Broomfield. At times, it looked like our village would be completely swallowed up into 'Greater Chelmsford'. Fortunately, that hasn't happened. So, here's a quick summary of the last 5 years, where we've ended up – and where we might have been.

#### Act One - The Threat

Rewind to October 2015. The first stage of the Local Plan looked like a disaster for Broomfield. The City Council's first option would have built 1,500 more houses to the north-west of the village (one of the most valued areas of the surrounding countryside), plus another 200 (already planned) around Broomfield Place, opposite the Angel pub. And a new road from Writtle to Little Waltham.

A new road – that's good, isn't it? Well, not really. Major roads take 30 - 50 years to materialise. But once a line is drawn on a map, developers pour in to 'help'. Major road schemes need massive funding. Developers will contribute to the cost of the road, but only if they get permission to 'infill' on land up to the new road line. Sadly, new infrastructure usually lags a long way behind associated development, so problems often get worse in the meantime. Plus, in this case, a new road to the north-west of Broomfield would have caused massive environmental damage without doing much to help the existing traffic problems. They're mainly caused by cars queuing to get into Chelmsford city centre.

#### Act Two - Broomfield Fights Back!

Act Two was the most dramatic part of the whole story. Led by the Planning Committee guerilla fighters, the Parish Council fought back!

#### Remember these?



And this queue? January 9th 2016, but it's not a queue for the January Sales. It's Broomfield folk queuing in the cold and damp to get into the 'Save Broomfield' Open Day.



It's vital to let local people know what's heading their way. Once yellow planning notices appear on lampposts, it's too late. If the planners think that local people aren't too bothered, you don't stand a chance.

But making people aware is just one part of the fight. No one wants lots of development in their village and, as the planners will remind you, 'development has to go somewhere and they can't please everyone.'

So, we decided to take other measures as well, including:

- Getting advice from planning and traffic experts so that we could put forward a highquality, professional case
- Identifying alternative sites for development
- mainly along the A12 corridor or the former Boreham Airfield, where the new North-East Bypass was already planned

- Building alliances with neighbouring parish councils. The City Council can afford to upset one parish, but crossing swords with six is a bit harder
- Starting our own Neighbourhood Plan. A neighbourhood plan can't stop development, but it gives a local community more control about where development goes and provides a bit more 'clout' in negotiations with the powers-that-be. With a combination of all of the above, we got the housing numbers down from 1,700 to

1,000 - and no new road line to infill.

#### **Act Three**

More boring by comparison. Using our new status as an 'emerging neighbourhood plan' area, we got a seat at the high table, where we could ask searching questions. Such as 'So where are all these kids going to school then?' (plans for a new primary school in Broomfield had just fallen through). This led to the planned new estate 'north of Broomfield' being reduced from 800 to 450 dwellings. And the existing commitment to build 200 houses opposite the Angel being dropped altogether.

#### Act Four - the Finale


Lots more boring stuff. Late night writing of documents in planning speak, to present to the Planning Inspector. Liaising with our friends in neighbouring parishes. Feeling a bit stupid in front of the assembled ranks of planners and developers at the Public Examination – fortunately, we still had our expert professionals in tow.

The area shaded red is the 'north of Broomfield' development site, now reduced to 450 dwellings. The area shaded blue, around Broomfield Place, was going to be 200+ dwellings, but has now been saved.

#### The Reviews

So, what was the final verdict – rave reviews or flop? Well, Broomfield has to accommodate about half of the 450 new dwellings in the new estate 'north of Broomfield', between Blasford Hill and the Hospital. But to offset some of this. we have been spared the 200 new dwellings opposite the Angel which were already in the pipeline. Overall, perhaps not a bad result compared to the threat we faced back in 2015.

Plus, rather to our surprise, the City and County Councils have got significant



government investment towards the cost of the new North-East Bypass and the new rail station near Boreham. These should move some traffic away from Main Road and could help to point future development towards the east rather than the north of Chelmsford.

#### And what did we learn?

Always try to be ahead of the curve if you can. Try to get in there and negotiate to avoid or mitigate threats before they come hurtling down the track towards you. The first Review of the Local Plan will begin soon, even as the ink is drying on the original. This Review may well mean finding more land for development across Chelmsford, so we can't afford to take our eye off the ball.

We've also learned you must have a tough group of astute, wily old parish councillors to lead the fight, people who are prepared to do lots of boring stuff behind the scenes, for which they probably won't get much credit. And you need a strong group of residents, who care deeply about the environment, their village and the beautiful countryside that surrounds it. Fortunately, in Broomfield we have both.

mainline and into London, with key public transport, walking and cycling networks to it.

#### **Around the Village:**

The grass cutting season has commenced and thanks to JCM Services for doing such a good job. Essex Place Services have carried out a Tree Survey to ensure all the trees growing on land either owned or registered to Broomfield Parish Council are healthy and in safe condition.

The Angel Meadow Play Area and fitness equipment opened recently in line with Government advice. The areas have been sanitised but the Parish Council will not be doing any daily cleaning or disinfecting and request that visitors observe the 2m social distancing rule and hygiene practices are observed - please bring your own wipes etc. We have removed some swings & request only ONE FAMILY MEMBER accompanies a child.

#### From the Allotment Site:

On reflection, providing a skip two weeks after the all the recycling centres closed, was inviting problems. But it was booked in February and the good weather promised an ideal time for the allotment holders to have a tidy-up before the growing season got going. Unfortunately, the skip filled up on the first day, and by the second day, the allotment holders came in to see this.....



However, with more time on their hands, the tenants have been making the best of the good weather and the allotments are looking better than ever.

One part of the allotments will be getting a serious tidy up, and it looks like the council will have enough new space for some smaller allotments that would suit someone of limited mobility. The final design has still to be agreed, but raised beds, with firm, level ground around for ease of access. Right by the car park and with a nearby tap it would be the perfect place for someone who wants to garden but cannot bend to work the soil.

# Vandalism hits Angel Meadow & Centenary Wood

Many of you will have seen first-hand, or on social media, the serious damage that has been done to some of the trees in Centenary Wood. This is not the first example of vandalism in recent weeks, two other recently planted trees were snapped off and some young men used a picnic table as a place to use their disposable barbeques causing considerable damage. The netball post has been irreparably damaged – this has now been replaced at a cost to all parishioners. We have reported these incidents to Chelmsford Police but they are unable to help. ... There is very little we can do about this other than issue a plea for information.

In the first example mentioned above, people were stripping the bark from some trees and carving their initials into another. However, a letter of apology has been received from two individuals expressing deep regret for the damage that they had caused and enclosing a contribution towards the cost of the damage. The next time you visit the nature reserve, you will see a sturdy new bridge over the brook. A much-needed improvement which was partly paid-for by this money.










Public Rights of Way Map

## Using the Broomfield paths



Public Rights of Way in Broomfield are mostly well-signed (although signage is poorer to the east and around new housing). Look out for yellow arrows for footpaths, or blue arrows for bridleways. Where a path joins a road, concrete, wooden or metal signs often indicate "Public Footpath" or "Bridleway". Many

footpaths in Broomfield have the path number carved into, or painted on, the sign. Path numbers are only unique to the parish, not between parishes.

Two longer-distance paths, the **Chelmsford Centenary Circle** and the **Saffron Trail**, pass through Broomfield and have their own waymarkers.



**Footpaths** are allowed to be used for walking, running, mobility scooters or powered wheelchairs. **Bridleways** are allowed to be used for walking, horse riding, bicycles, mobility scooters or powered wheelchairs. **Restricted byways** are allowed to be used for any transport without a motor and mobility scooters or powered wheelchairs. **Byways open to all traffic** are open to any kind of transport, including cars.

Please follow the Countryside Code, keep strictly to the paths, and take care when crossing roads.





#### What to do if you need urgent police help through the 999 service, but can't speak

If you're in an emergency situation and need police help, but can't speak Make Yourself Heard and let the 999 operator know your call is genuine.

WHEN YOU CALL 999
All 999 calls are directed to call centres and will be answered by BT operators. They will ask which service you need. If no service is requested but anythin suspicious is heard throughout the process, BT operators will connect you to a police call handler.

IF YOU CALL 999 FROM A MOBILE It is always best to speak to the operator if you can, even by whispering. You may also be asked to cough or tap the keys on your phone in response to questions.

If making a sound would put you or someone else in danger and the BT operator cannot decide whether an emergency service is needed, your call will be transferred to the Silent Solution system.

The Silent Solution is a police system used to filter out large numbers of accidental or hoax 999 calls. It also exists to help people who are unable to speak, but who genuinely need police assistance You will hear an automated police message, which lasts for 20

seconds and begins with you are through to the police'. It will ask you to press 55 to be put through to the to police al. mill ask you to press 55 to be put through to police call management. The BT operator will remain on the line and listen. If you press 55, they will be notified and transfer the call to the police. If you don't press 55, the call will be terminated. Pressing 55 does not allow police to track your location.

WHAT THEN?

will attempt to communicate
with you by asking simple yes
or no questions. If you are not
able to speak, listen carefully to
the questions and instructions
from the call handler so they can
assess your call and arrange help
if needed.

IF YOU CALL 999 FROM A LANDLINE Because it's less likely that 999 calls are made by accident from landlines, the Silent Solution system is not used.

a landline is received: - there is no request for an

- there is no request for an emergency
 - the caller does not answer questions
 - only background noise can be heard and BT operators cannot decide whether an emergency service is needed, then you will be connected to a police call handler as doubt exists.

If you replace the handset, the landline may remain connected for 45 seconds in case you pick it up again.

If you pick up again during this 45 seconds and the BT operator is concerned for your safety, the call will be connected to police. landlines, information about where you're calling from should be automatically available to the call handlers to help provide

We hope everyone has been keeping safe and well over the last few months. The decision to close libraries across the county was made very quickly in March, so we were not able to update our customers at that time!



#### What a rural scene

As readers to the Broomfield Times will know I keep a close eye on online auction sites for unusual images of Broomfield.

We are already lucky to have those collected by Ken Searles and published in Broomfield in old picture postcards and fortunate that at the Essex Record Office (ERO) in Chelmsford are preserved the surviving images from the three generations of Fred Spaldings photographers.

Now and again a postcard or image appears that is not known to me and I always try and purchase it not only for my own research into the parish but also to share through the pages of this magazine as well as for deposit at the ERO. Earlier on this year several stereoscopic images of mid-Essex were put up for sale.

These types of images were an early attempt to improve on 2D photographs whereby two similar but slightly offset images were taken of the same subject and when looked at through a special viewer one saw a 3D effect. For sale were some images of Chelmsford, Broomfield, Little Waltham and Felsted with a suggested date of them having been taken around 1860.

The Broomfield ones comprised a view from inside the church, 'The road to the mill near Broomfield', 'Bridge over the Chelmer', a 'Road in Broomfield' and, finally a fairly standard image of Broomfield Mill (pictured - in future issues I'll share the other images with you). I successfully won them all apart from the latter which didn't concern me as this is a building that has had many images taken of it over the years.



The most intriguing image was 'A road in Broomfield' as I couldn't place it to begin with. My first thought was that it might have been Scots Green but that didn't seem right, the road layout didn't match. Having slept on it, it suddenly occurred to me that it was the cottage at the top of Mill Lane, part of Hill Farm, looking north along Back Lane towards Little Waltham



What an interesting image to take but why? It tied in with some of the other images (Broomfield Mill, bridge over the Chelmer and one which I didn't purchase of Little Waltham church, so you can imagine the photographer having a day in the Chelmer valley taking snaps) and perhaps it was a scene that tickled the unknown photographer – a piece of rural life with the ploughman on a muddy, winter road. And it is this that makes it interesting. Normally the village church would always be photographed along with any prominent local buildings but generally not a country road.

And when was it taken? Not the advertised 1860 which is too early. My best guess is about 1890 before Hill Farm buildings extended right up to Back Lane – the lane heading off to the right leads to the farmyard. The ploughman is unknown but it is interesting that Ken Searles does have in Broomfield in old picture postcards an image (37) from the 1890s of a ploughman Fred Watts who was believed to have worked at Hill Farm. Is this just coincidence? And who was the photographer?

# Surgical robots are back in action for patients



Patients are now being welcomed back into surgery across mid and south Essex with the return of state-of-the-art robots.

The Da Vinci X robots at Broomfield and Southend hospitals, which are used to perform life-changing operations in specialties including urology, gastro-intestinal, and ear, nose and throat (ENT), are now back in use for the first time since March.

Southend's robot had only been in place for a matter of weeks before coronavirus hit. Consultant urologist and robotic surgeon Mohamed Abdalazeez is pleased to get the service back underway for patients and praised the theatres' team for their hard work.



He said: "It's great to be able to get back to our regular patients again. To get here has taken a lot of teamwork and effort from everyone - the theatres' manager, our matron, staff nurses, surgical care practitioner, the robot team and our anaesthetists. It's collaborative work between all of us."

The robot in Southend is mainly used for prostate cancer operations. Mr Abdalazeez explained how some things have had to change working in the 'new normal' world of Covid. "We used to send the patient home the next day if everything had gone well, but since Covid we try to send them home the same day. After the operation we wait for around six hours then have a discussion with the anaesthetists and the patient if we have no concerns. I'm pleased to say that so far there have been no complications."

At Broomfield, Covid meant many theatre staff were temporarily working in intensive care and Theatre 17, where the robot operates from, which became the part of the hospital's critical care unit. Marielle Huddlestone, robotic lead nurse, explained how the robot and staff returned to normal duties after helping in the fight with Covid. She said: "We've restarted colorectal cancer cases, urology, adrenalectomies, and head and neck ENT cases. We're looking forward to increasing the number of cases and growing the robotic service'

It is with some sadness the Thursday clap has finished; like many of you I live near the Main Road and continued banging my saucepan until 8:15 to enjoy the changeover of NHS staff at Broomfield, the beeps and waves from workers, the blue lights from the ambulances and occasional sirens from the fire engines that were drafted in to support paramedics. Monitoring is great for getting even closer to nature. Recording what you see helps local

## A very special painting

Some Broomfield residents may not be aware that the tower of our St Mary's church in Broomfield conceals an artistic treasure a wall painting that is possibly the only true fresco in an English church.



In case you are not sure what the difference is between a wall painting and a fresco, then I will explain – a "buon fresco" is painted directly on to wet, fresh plaster. A wall painting may be painted on to a dry wall.

The story of our fresco at St Mary's is a fascinating one. It was painted during the Second World War in 1941 by Rosemary Rutherford, daughter of the Revd John Rutherford, Vicar of Broomfield from 1930-1957. Rosemary was a recognised artist of her time. She had become interested in fresco painting before the war when there had been a resurgence of interest in it. At the end of the nineteenth century frescos had been attempted in the new Houses of Parliament

building but these had been unsuccessful. The difficulty with frescos is getting the paint to stick to the wall as it dries. Even the famous Leonardo Da Vinci fresco of the Last Supper in the monastery in Milan started to peel off the wall almost as soon as he had finished it.

Rosemary was determined to create a successful fresco and somehow obtained permission from her father to paint on the inside wall of the tower. No permission was sought from the Diocese of Chelmsford authorities for the work. It seems to have been carried out in a rather clandestine fashion. Revd Rutherford apparently believed that he had sole authority over what went on in the tower of his church.

Rosemary's brother, John Alton Rutherford assisted her with the work, as preparing a wall for fresco painting is fairly hard manual labour. Later. John wrote about their work in the Broomfield magazine 1975. Here is his account of the proceedings.

"Day after day we locked ourselves in and quietly chipped off the plaster down to the flint wall over an area of approximately seven feet by five feet. Each evening after dark I carried out buckets of rubble and hid them at the top of the churchyard! Once down to the foundation we layered four layers of lime mortar, allowing each one to dry before adding the next. The fifth layer was of mortar made with lime and ground white marble, giving a beautiful white surface, and each day we laved only as much as could be painted while it was still wet. The earth colours then sank in and could not peel off. The blues have faded a bit, as the paint should have been mixed with egg, and there were no fresh eggs."

Rosemary and John's hard work paid off and the fresco has survived in our tower remarkably well. It is a large, powerful painting showing Jesus Christ stilling the storm on Lake Galilee (Luke 8:22-25), surrounded by his frightened disciples. In 2003 restoration work was carried out on it and again this year, during May, we have had a conservation expert in to check its condition. Fortunately,

the fresco seems to be in reasonable condition although some cleaning and preservation work is now necessary. The humidity in the tower is a problem and this is caused by the holes made by the woodpeckers in the spire and the fact that the tower walls need repointing. We urgently need to seek funding to repair this historic part of our church and preserve this unique work of art.

The PCC and the Grant Application group are preparing a bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund for the £150,000 needed to do this essential repair work. We are hoping that the unique nature of the fresco will provide the key that unlocks the necessary grant aid. Rosemary Rutherford also created our stained glass windows in the chancel and the big East window over the altar, so we have a special Rutherford interest in the church. We also have the Rutherford graves in the churchyard beside the tower. Our thinking is that we can offer our community and the artistic community a special insight into the post-war

style of art that Rosemary's work exemplifies. We want too to increase access to the fresco and encourage all kinds of experimental church art in people of all ages.

We very much want to involve the whole Broomfield community in this project. Our ancient church building stands at the heart of the village and is one of our most precious assets. As soon as our church is open again we will be welcoming visitors to come and look at the fresco and share their impressions of it. We want to create an ongoing tribute to our own Broomfield artist, Rosemary Rutherford.

Whichever way you contact us, you will receive a response. If you do not hear back, please try again!

We have also had to put some rules in place, in order to be Covid 19 safe and in order to open at all:

- You will not be allowed to light candles.
- Although the toilets will be open, we will not be encouraging use of the facilities!
- Please enter through the main church door and exit through the hall doors (in the link).
- When you leave please do not gather to chat in groups in the grounds or in the car park.
- There is to be no shaking of hands, hugging

- or other physical contact.
- PLEASE DO NOT COME INTO THE CHURCH BUILDING IF YOU SHOW ANY SYMPTOMS OF COVID 19 EVEN IF YOU HAVE BOOKED TO COME! (new continuous cough, high temperature, loss of taste and/or smell)
- IF YOU EXPERIENCE ANY OF THESE SYMPTOMS AFTER ATTENDING THE CHURCH PLEASE LET ONE OF THE MINISTERS KNOW.

## Please look out for SCAM PHONE CALLS (see example below)

And so it begins:

'Good morning, I'm calling from the NHS track and trace service. According to our system, you are likely to have been in close proximity to someone who has tested positive for COVID-19. This means that you now need to self-isolate for 7 days and take a COVID-19 test.'

'OK. Can you tell me who that person was?'

'I'm not able to tell you that. That is confidential information.'

'Right. Um... so ....'

'But you do need to be tested within the next 72 hours. So can I just get the best mailing address so that we can send a kit to you?'

'Ok (gives address)'

# 'Thank you - and I just need to take a payment card so that we can finalise this and send the kit to you.'

'Sorry - a payment card? I thought this was all free?' (IT IS!!)

'No - I'm afraid not. There is a one-off fee of £50 for the kit, and test results. Could you read off the long card number for me, please, when you're ready.'

'No - that's not right. This is part of the NHS so there's no charge.'

'I'm afraid there is. Can you give me the card number please - this is very important, and there are penalties for not complying' Puts phone down.

This is how scammers work. Please DO NOT fall for it.

IF IN DOUBT SPEAK TO A FRIEND/ NEIGHBOUR/COUNCIL/POLICE. !REMEMBER! NEVER GIVE OUT YOUR BANK ACCOUNT DETAILS TO ANYONE!

## News from Neighbourhood Watch:

## Introduction to single online home (soh) for anti-social behaviour

Single Online Home is a national web service that offers forces in England and Wales various digital opportunities around online reporting and Live chat (7am-11pm), enabling members of the public to 'self-serve'.

In July 2019, Essex Police launched the Single Online Home (SOH) portal on our website for the recording of crime online and members of the public have been successfully using this service to report crimes to us (the Resolution Centre).

A decision has been made to extend the reporting options of SOH to now include the reporting of Antisocial behaviour (ASB) in Essex. This will bring Essex Police in line with other forces such as The Metropolitan Police, Northamptonshire, Sussex, Merseyside and Greater Manchester who are already live and using this additional functionality.

The current Essex Police website reporting page already has an icon to select for reporting ASB but up until now this has simply

been a tool to provide simple advice and has a default position of advice to the public to call us on 101.

From 19th May this icon will provide direct online reports for the ASB service and is built around a set of 5 core forms:

- 1. Report the behaviour of someone
- 2. Report a problem with your neighbour
- 3. Report a problem with an animal
- 4. Report a vehicle causing an obstruction
- 5. Report an abandoned vehicle

The new system will triage reports, providing advice to members of the public at each step, it looks for opportunities at each stage of the reporting process to signpost to other agencies where appropriate and where necessary will guide the reporting person to the online reporting tool that will enable them to report the matter to us online, channel shifting members of the public away from dialling 101.

## **Favourite recipes**

Here are some favourite recipes from Councillors Angela Thomson & Sue Hubble for you to try:

#### **Apple and Ginger Squares**

11b (450g) Cooking Apples 8 oz (225g) SR Flour whole wheat flour 6 oz (175g) Butter or Marg 1 ½ tsps. Ground ginger 6 oz (175g) light muscavado sugar ½ tsps. Cinnamon 3 eggs ¼ pint (140 ml) Double cream (optional) 1 tbsp. Honey

1/4 tsps. Cinnamon (if using cream)

Grease an 8 in (20 cm) tin. Peel, core & chop the apples. Cream the fat & sugar until light. Add the eggs, then the honey. Sift the flour & spices into the mixture & stir well; continue adding the apples. Turn the mixture into the tin & bake for 1 ½ hours at 180 c 350 F Gas Mark 4.

Cut into six or more slices – when cool, whip the cream, add the cinnamon & pipe onto the squares (optional)

## Rhubarb and Ginger Jam Recipe Makes 4 jars

30 mins plus 2 hours to soak

Since taking an allotment plot four years ago, left over from the previous occupant, is an abundance of Rhubarb, which pops up every year without fail. I have given it away, made numerous rhubarb crumbles and frozen it but by far my favourite thing is to make this really simple recipe. Why don't you try it too?

1 kg rhubarb 1 kg sugar (which has added pectin) 4cm piece of ginger peeled Zest and juice of 1 lemon 50g stem or crystallised ginger finely chopped

#### Method

- Wash the rhubarb under cold running water and slice into 2cm pieces. Tip into a large glass or plastic bowl and add the jam sugar, lemon zest and juice, and chopped stem ginger. Finely grate the peeled ginger directly over the rhubarb.
- 2. Stir the mixture thoroughly, cover loosely with cling film and leave to one side for about 2 hrs to allow the sugar to dissolve into the rhubarb juices. You may need to stir the mixture occasionally to encourage this process along.
- 3. Pop a few saucers in the freezer. Scoop the fruit and all the sugary juices into a preserving pan and set over a medium heat. Stir until the sugar has completely dissolved and bring to the boil. Continue to cook at a swift pace until the rhubarb is tender and the conserve has reached setting point this should take about 12 to 15 mins.
- 4. To test for a set, drop ½ tsp of the jam onto a cold saucer, leave it for 30 secs, then gently push it with the tip of your finger. If the jam wrinkles the setting point has been reached. If not, continue to cook for a further couple of minutes and test again.
- 5. Remove the pan from the heat and leave to one side for 2-3 mins before pouring into sterilised jars. Seal immediately and label with the date once completely cold.
