

# Broomfield Hospital Garden of Remembrance for staff who have died of Covid-19

Broomfield Parish Council has donated a bench which has been placed in a new garden created near Broomfield Court within the Hospital's grounds. Councillor Margaret Bleet was privileged to be invited to attend the opening ceremony.

The ceremony included a tribute to all staff but particularly the Hotel Services staff which

includes cleaners and catering staff who have been affected badly by COVID-19.

The grounds and gardens team identified a suitable area that linked to the sunken garden project and the health and well-being area. The funding for this project was approved by the MSE Charity Trustees utilising monies donated from Captain Sir Tom Moore's fundraising efforts, and the 30th April 2021 is the anniversary of Sir Tom's birthday - a tree has been planted today in his honour,

adjacent to the garden. The tree will grow to 18 metres which is a wonderful symbol.

The garden is open to all members of the publics as are the 22 hectares of grounds. Here are some pictures taken.

I was fortunate to be elected in his place on the 6th May 2021. I have a history of addressing Essex County Council issues and now I can deal with them from the inside as a County Councillor.

My background includes being a Parish Councillor for the last 20 years and I am also a City Councillor for Broomfield and the Walthams. The Broomfield and Writtle County Council division is physically large and covers a number of rural parish areas, namely Writtle, Broomfield, Great Waltham, Little Waltham,

Great and Little Leighs, Chignal, Good Easter, Highwood, Pleshey, Roxwell, Mashbury and the new developments in Broomfield, Little Waltham and Chignal. I intend to join the many Parish Council meetings when I can, and have already started. I am a great believer in Parish Councils and their knowledge of the local issues. Like John, I will continue to send information on ECC initiatives and issues to future editions of your parish magazine.

#### **From the City Council**

As life returns to normal CCC has opened all leisure centres, including the ice rink. Although, direct debits were frozen during Covid however, 3,000 memberships joined in April.

City life magazine has gone on line; I would be interested to know if you have access to this or if you will miss it? The new online version is giving free advertising to local sport and activity clubs; what would give you confidence to re-join an activity again?

A new Skate Park on Broomfield's border, Channel Drive has been delivered and the Pegasus crossing (to include your horse!) is progressing nicely across the A130 to connect central Broomfield to the New Channels Development and the park.

New Pegasus crossing over Essex Regiment Way:

I take no pleasure in announcing this Summer you will see parking charges brought to Hylands Park, £3 per day per car for Chelmsford residents, the Council is seeking to introduce annual discounted passes.

Some of you will notice the application for the new spine road through Bloor Homes development; along with the housing number for this allocated site has crept to 571; Officers are not satisfied that Bloor Homes planning application aligns with the Local Plan policies. Talks are ongoing, the application can be viewed on line.

New Roads application for double yellow lines (just on the corner), met with no objection and should be implemented this August.

Essex County Council (ECC) working in partnership with Chelmsford City Council (CCC) have secured £218M of Housing Infrastructure Funding (HIF) to construct the Chelmsford North East Bypass (CNEB) and a new rail station to the north east of Chelmsford. Beaulieu Station expected completion date is December 2025. If you have concerns about any issue please contact me, wendy.daden@chelmsford.gov.uk

# **Chelmsford City Council Movement Around The City**

E-scooters. This year saw the launch of 265 SPIN E-scooters in the Chelmsford area; offering NHS free use has seen 216 trips by our heroes; 1796 passes have been sold and almost 31,000 total rides since the launch.

You must be over 18 with a provisional or full driving license to hire, and sober! The uniqueness is, outside the city centre, the scooters can be left (responsibly) at a destination convenient for you and the scooters will be recharged or removed by Spin.

The scheme is still in trial phase, which is currently seeking your views to understand

how you are using them, with a function to report under age riders and misuse via the app.

## Cycling and Walking

Chelmsford is changing to prioritise cycling and walking over vehicles.

#### **Annual Report** from the Chairman **Councillor John Barnes April 2021**

2020/21 has been a year like no other which has presented

the Council with many unique challenges. I will start by recognising and thanking our staff team who have worked throughout the year from home and on site to keep our facilities safe, clean and up to standard. As best as possible we have kept our support services going and have used the time that the Village Hall has been closed to improve and maintain our properties and facilities.

The last full meeting that we held in the Hall was in February 2020 from then on, we were in Lockdown or, under special legislation, holding meetings using Zoom. We co-opted Sue Hubble to the Council and agreed to meet monthly instead of bi-monthly. We have also welcomed Councillors Donna Hance, Jason Need, Margaret Bleet and Gloria Scott to the Council. We had a number of resignations during the year and we would like to thank all Councillors who have served the Village, as volunteers, for their very valuable input.

#### **Broomfield Youth Club**

We were approached by a group who wanted to set up a Youth Club for the young people of the Village – initial discussions identified they required an independent property that the young people could call their own. Much discussion took place on suitable locations and in February we held a Special Meeting to discuss the project with the proposed contractors. A large number of members of the public attended which generated a great number of ideas and opinions so was very valuable. Those thoughts and ideas continue to be built into the planning. The majority of the Council remain behind the project and we are now looking at a more expensive option of extending the Village Hall - it can still be independent with its own entrance and facilities but will take longer to bring to fruition. However, we have a determined group of Councillors working very hard to support the idea and I sincerely hope that we can bring it off.

#### **Broomfield Place**

Essex County Council own a parcel of land south of Broomfield Place which they wish to develop - initially with a plan to seek residential planning permission for the land which they knew we would oppose. However, following public consultation, we put a proposal to EEC that part of the site be developed with community based assets and a proportion left as public open space. We remained sympathetic to a limited amount of residential development preferably affordable housing. Following meetings with ECC we are delighted to be able to report that they have agreed to withdraw their plans to seek residential planning and have put forward a much more modest plan for an adult training centre and a large amount of public open space – however, there can be no guarantees that this will happen but we must remain confident.

#### **Neighbourhood Plan**

Work on the Neighbourhood Plan has continued throughout the year and we do have to thank Cllr John Blake and his team for their diligent work. In December John started a process of presenting draft sections of the plan which will continue through to the Summer 2021 when Council will be able to approve the full document so that we can start the consultation process.

#### **Grants made**

We have made a number of grants to Community Groups during the year:

- £750 to Essex Dementia Care Trust towards running their events in Broomfield.
- £250 to The Friends of Broomfield Hospital for a bench in a staff garden.
- £2,000 towards replacement windows at the Copland Trust Alms House in School Lane.
- £1,750 to St Mary with St Leonard's Church to provide a water catchment system for the churchyard.
- £2,000 to Chelmer Valley High School PTA towards the development of an all-weather sports facility.
- £2,000 towards replacement doors at the Copland Trust Alms House in School Lane.
- £1,000 to 3B's Broomfield Bereavement Group to further develop their garden

#### Staffing

Our Clerk Mike Letch decided to resign in November after serving us very diligently through the pandemic. I would like to record here a very great thanks to Mike and wish him the best of luck for the future. I am delighted to be able to report that we were able to secure the services of Mark Hembury who joined on 1st April and I am sure he will prove a very able successor to Mike and we all look forward to working with him going forward. As the year came to an end, Cllr John Aldridge, our representative at Essex County Council, advised us that he was not standing for reelection to Essex in May. John has represented Broomfield for 16 years and has been a very important supporter and wise counsel during that time. We expect that whoever is elected in his place will serve us equally well but he or she will have big boots to fill. Thank you, John, most sincerely.

### Work of the Village Amenities Committee: Angel Meadow Play Area:

The play area required extensive renovation (see Village Amenities committee report) and we were very proud to re-open the play area on Good Friday. The park is now fully operational and proving hugely popular. Thanks to ClIr Sue Hubble for leading the project on behalf of the Council and our member of staff, Stuart Jones, for project managing the work.

#### **Allotment Site**

We are very proud of our allotment site. The tenants work really hard on their own plots and the site is looking fantastic. This year we have started to build interest an Allotment Association to give the Tenants a greater input into the site management. Much work has been carried out by the Committee to improve the site.

#### **Broomfield in Bloom**

We would like to install planted displays around the village, what we call Broomfield in Bloom. Lockdown has delayed this project but this year we will working hard on it.

Work of the Broomfield Village Hall Charity Committee:

The Village Hall was redeveloped a few years ago support by a Public Works Board loan and now this has been fully repaid it was agreed

to instruct an architect to come up with ideas for what we could do to improve and extend the hall. We have resurfaced the Village Hall carpark this year and tackled problems with the Adventure Cycle Way – further details in the Village Hall Report.

#### Tree for Life Scheme

This has been well supported and 20 babies have had trees planted in the new orchard on David Smith Field and also in their own gardens. We are extending this to 2021 so please let the Parish Council know if you would like to join the Scheme.

Can I thank all of my colleagues for commitment to the Village, they give their time voluntarily without any compensation.

Finally, I need to report that at the Annual Meeting in May I stood down as Chair handing over the leadership of the Council to Margaret Bleet who brings huge experience and wisdom to the role. I know that all Councillors are looking forward to working with Margaret.

# Annual Report from the Planning Committee

#### April 2021

It's hard to remember 'normal' Committee life before lockdown. We used to sit round a table in a small office, unmasked, leaning over application plans or huddled round a laptop! Although the Committee hasn't been to meet in person during the last 13 months, its work has continued nonetheless. Councillors have been studying the plans and other documents online and then discussing them by e-mail. The conclusions are then formally presented to the planning authority by our Clerk. So, the local community has not lost its voice on planning issues, despite Covid.

Lockdown hasn't led to any noticeable drop off in planning applications! During lockdown in 2020, we were sent 90 applications to comment on and in the first two months of this year, there have been another 20.

### The 'North of Broomfield' Planning Application

We also held a Zoom meeting to confirm our full response to the biggest application received since May 2019. This application was from Bloor Homes, for the large development site 'North of Broomfield'. It is due to be built between Blasford Hill and Broomfield Hospital, within the red line marked on this Google Earth map.




This development site is included in the new Chelmsford Local Plan. City councillors voted to approve this last May, so the principle of the development cannot now be challenged. We have however objected to the scale of the development. The Local Plan allows for a development of around 450 dwellings, but the developers have applied for permission to build 550! We believe this is quite inappropriate for a development on the edge of the village, abutting open countryside. The Local Plan is clear that it should be 'landscape led', not 'housing led'.

You can read our full response by going onto the homepage at **www.broomfieldessex.co.uk**. It's now several items down the page, under the heading 'Council objects to 550 home estate North of Broomfield'. In brief, the main points of our objection were:

- 1. 550 dwellings is far too many for the site, which is only meant to have around 450.
- 2. The additional traffic will add to the existing severe traffic problems on Main Road
- 3. The development is supposed to include provision of a new access into Broomfield Hospital. This must be included in the application and the Council would like it to be multi-use, not restricted to staff, deliveries etc.
- 4. The development should include a substantial tree belt to screen it from the higher land to the west and to act as a wildlife corridor.

We await the City Council's decision on this application. It is likely to be a long haul. Even before the application came in, there had been a lengthy consultation process about the Masterplan for this site. We put in a lot of comments at that stage, working together our neighbours at Little Waltham Parish Council, with whom we share many concerns. So it feels like this proposal has been with us for a long time. It will continue to be so!



Chelmsford Local Plan As indicated above, the 'North of Broomfield' allocation forms part of the new Chelmsford Local Plan

In May 2020, this new Local Plan was finally adopted by Chelmsford

City Council. The Plan controls where new development – houses, roads, shops and other facilities – will go between now and 2036. It's taken 6 years to get there!

For most of that time, the threat of mass development has been hanging over Broomfield. At times, it looked like our village would be completely swallowed up into 'Greater Chelmsford'. Fortunately, that hasn't happened. You can read all about the long, hard-fought struggle to save our village – see the article in the Summer 2020 Issue 62 of the Broomfield Times. If you no longer have your copy, you can read back issues on our website.

Yet more Changes to the Planning System!
Last August, the Government proposed another fundamental change to the Planning System in England. The new Government White Paper proposed doing away with separate planning permission in 'Growth areas', meaning that local communities would only get a say on new development while a Local Plan is being drawn up. Where land is earmarked for 'Growth' in a Local Plan, a developer wouldn't need to apply for outline planning consent.

The Government's aim is to 'modernise', simplify and speed up the planning process so that new developments can be built quicker. The scope of local plans and neighbourhood plans would be reduced, in order to speed up the delivery of development.

Alongside these proposed changes, the Government promoted a new, more 'objective' algorithm to calculate how many new houses need to be built in each area. This idea was clearly thought up before the problems with last year's A-level exams showed that algorithms aren't always the ideal solution for everything - they can have unintended consequences!

The new algorithm suggested that lots more houses would need to be built in the South-East, thereby burying aspects of the 'Northern Powerhouse' in concrete and suggesting that Chelmsford would have to find land for almost twice the number of houses currently planned. Fortunately, following a lot of pressure from its own MPs and supporters, the Government has now stepped back and is developing a different approach to calculating housing need.

The Planning Committee put in a very full and robust response to the White Paper by the deadline at the end of last October.

Finally, we were very pleased to welcome Jason Need on to the Committee earlier this year. Jason has lived in Broomfield for many years and brings with him the experience of being a Borough Councillor and cabinet member in an earlier life. So we are sure he will be a great asset to the Committee and to Broomfield.



We're still processing the additional comments - as these are open-ended free text, they take a long time to classify. However, we want to share with you the results so far. We received 423 responses in total, on paper or by e-mail or online. These reflect the views of 806 people, as many people filled out the form jointly as a couple, family etc. We're very grateful to every resident who responded, giving us a good response rate for this type of survey.

#### The main question was:

Do you support the ECC Proposal for New Open Green Space and Community Buildings

These percentages are based on the number of responses received, but they are almost the same if you base it on the total number of people responding.

What people like and dislike about the **County Council's Proposal** So far, the main things that people seem to like are:

- The large amount of green open space, with unspoilt natural environment
- The access for the local community and the overall community focus
- The provision for vulnerable people and people with disabilities and their carers.

So far, there are few dislikes in comparison.

Where expressed, the main concern is about traffic and access. We asked if people had views about the use of the semi-wild woodland area behind Broomfield Place house and garden. So far, the main preference is for it to be left wild or semi-wild.

As we finish going through all the general comments, further views may well emerge. As soon as we complete the work, we will put a full report on this website. Once again, thanks to everyone who took part in this consultation.

#### Annual Report from the Village Amenities Committee

#### April 2021

#### **Playground**

Of course, our biggest achievement to date is the refurbishment of the playground. A large pirate ship was reincarnated as "Jolly Rainbow". This was as an accolade to NHS for all the marvellous work they have done on behalf of us all during the pandemic and the ship has now been adorned with a rainbow flag. The whole of the playground surface was replaced and play items were either replaced or refurbished. This was achieved by using CIL money. A seesaw destined for landfill was donated to Little Waltham PC.







On Good Friday, as winners of choosing the ship's name, Thomas and Lucy declared the playground "Open".

#### What else have we done?

We have replaced two damaged Silver Birch trees on David Smith Field with two Hornbeams as the trees were close to picnic benches and some people suffer with allergies to Silver Birch. Our village attendant installed a Notice Board in the bus shelter on Brassie Wood and we arranged several litter picks, collecting over 50 sacks of rubbish from our streets.



#### **Allotment Site**

- Installed two waist-high raised beds for plot holders with mobility problems.
- Installed two large water harvesting tanks on the side of the barn.
- · Improved car parking facilities.
- Arranged for regular allotment plot inspections.
- Installed hand sanitiser at entrance of site.
- Installed height restriction barriers to deter large vehicles entering the site.
- · Cut back over-hanging trees.
- Provided skips to help plot holders remove hard to dispose of materials.
- Installed two new water taps.
- Structures in different areas of the site to be erected where water butts could be placed to save water.

#### **Centenary Wood**

Regular visits are made to ensure Woods are safe for children to play and litter free.

#### What is in the pipeline?

Broomfield in Bloom

Residents of Broomfield were asked if they live close to an area where a planter could be installed would they be willing to maintain one? Both CVHS and Essex Youth Build were asked if they would like to join us in our project and build planters for Broomfield.

They both agreed. Unfortunately, Covid-19 lock downs put the project "on hold"! CVHS are now unable to help us until at least September 2021 and Essex Youth Build are just ready to commence work again. A meeting is scheduled to take place on Monday 26 April to give details of what we want.

Five residents came forward offering to maintain planters and measurements were taken. Essex Highways have now granted permission for the five planters to go ahead to be made and licences are in the process of being drawn up with their Legal Department. Three other areas which do not require permission from Essex Highways will also have planters made; to date eight planters are in the pipeline and a few more requests have now come forward.

#### **Felsted Field Bus Shelter**

Within the Neighbourhood Plan, Plans have been drawn up which include a bus shelter and the area in front of the hedge may be replanted with wildflowers etc. Hopefully, funds will be available to get the work off the ground within the next couple of years.

# Annual Report from the Village Hall Committee:

We have a new feature on David Smith field this winter- our little orchard planted with trees for babies born to Broomfield families in 2020. We invited all parents of such babies to apply, and they could have their tree at home or planted in the field. This scheme will be continued this year.



The hall was redecorated at Easter 2020. The MUGA lights have been replaced with LED lights and the faulty car park lights have been replaced as well.





During the Summer of 2020 the car park surface was re-laid- with the existing foundations not proving strong this turned into a bigger job than anticipated.

The contractor was also asked to resurface the cycleway with a tar and chip finish. This job was left with a far too deep layer of loose chippings on top and the contractor was asked to rectify this. This took a long time and was eventually done by councillors and volunteers sweeping of the excess. During this time the public were understandably annoyed and we are very sorry this happened. It was decided to carry out a Spring review of the cycleway and ask two experts from the City Council to advise. This was arranged for the 20th April.



We have shared the results with one of our interested cycle track mums who was unable to attend, and they can be seen in full on the Parish Council website in a fuller version of this report. They consider the surface was in good condition and no work was required at present.

The MUGA (multi use games area) is now open for public use – we request that the public leave 30 minutes before a booking.

Steff, Fitz and Stuart are to be congratulated on their great efforts to maintain our Hall and keep it open whenever possible during the pandemic.

We continue to look ahead to improve our provision including investigating the possibility of a multi-use extension being built on the southern end.

As we had an incursion on the field last year soon height restriction barriers will be added.

We are looking to some new measures to respond to the Climate Emergency- a new bank of cycle racks; continuing our investigation into adding renewable energy for the hall; and switching to a sustainable and carbon neutral electricity supplier when the contract comes up for renewal.

In the Spring edition of Broomfield Times, I wrote about the waste-paper/cardboard collection undertaken by Broomfield Scouts. I indicated the additional funds that were generated from this source and how they had enabled the Scout Group, over the years, to provide additional equipment and subsidise activities for the members of the Group.

Alas, I spoke too soon as on Sunday 10th May in an act of mindless vandalism a group of youths set light to the paper skip. Not only was this mindless it was highly dangerous endangering nearby properties and their residents in a thoughtless act of vandalism.

Luckily the fire was spotted by a passer-by, the emergency services contacted and the fire put out. In addition to the damage caused, not only was a source of valuable income from the skip contents lost, costs were also incurred, by the Scout Group, in the removal of the skip from the site and the disposal of it's contaminated contents. Income that would have been used to benefit many young people of the Village had been lost by the actions of a minority.

# Friends at Broomfield Hospital – In times gone by...

The Friends at Broomfield Hospital were originally known as the League of Friends, the charity started life during the time when the hospital in Broomfield was a sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis patients.

Patients at the hospital could stay for anything up to four years and by the end of the second world war about 50% of patients were exservicemen from all parts of the country. In 1949, a year after the National Health Service was born, a group of philanthropic local people decided to provide small homely comforts such as soap, shampoo or other small gifts to these patients who were often a very long way from home and family.

The group expanded and in 1957 were first registered as the League of Friends charity whose only aim was to support Broomfield Hospital and membership grew as more people volunteered to help.

As the charity grew, a shop which opened operating from a small shed selling sweets, drinks and the like to the visitors, patients and staff. The shop was manned entirely by volunteers with all profits continuing to purchase small comforts for the patients. Over the years as profits increased, items such as bedside tables and curtains were purchased by the Friends.


A trolley service was set up to visit patients, then later a library service. Eventually a larger permanent shop opened on the ward block, with a second one opening in the hospital atrium many years later. Larger and larger pieces of equipment were purchased as profits grew from these busy shops.

# News from Broomfield Parish Church

Finally, the Parish Church, along with most other places is beginning to return to a more normal pattern of activity.

Our worship was the first priority and since Mothering Sunday we have opened our doors for worship, although, if you wish to attend you do need to book in advance. During March and April we were quite severely restricted numbers wise, but now as we move into this third stage of the Government's roadmap out of lockdown, we have been able to open more seats, clear the church hall and begin to open up more fully.

In June we have reintroduced a Mid-Week service for those who find it difficult to aet to church on a Sunday. We are also planning to hold our Songs of Praise, as we do every Summer, but this year it will take place in the Churchyard, rather than on the green. We are also opening up our Toddler Group, Little Lambs, from the 10th of June, as a support group for parents or carers of pre-school children. Again booking will be required for this as there is a limit on numbers. I am also discussing when the choir and bell ringers will be able to begin rehearsing again - if you are interested in joining either the choir or the band of bell ringers, we are always very happy to encourage people to get involved.

During lockdown we have progressed the prerequisite administration for the work which needs to be undertaken to repoint the round tower of the church, re-shingle the spire, restore the wind-vane to its rightful place and put in place an Arts project to show off the 'hidden gem' that is the Fresco, painted by Rosemary Rutherford inside the Round Tower.

You may have seen that we are launching an SOS ~ Save Our Spire campaign and I hope that people throughout the village will support this enthusiastically, as this historic Church is so much more than a place for the faithful worshipping community. It is a place where there is much hidden art work and



where history collides with today's world. It is also an attractive centre-piece for the village and a recognised landmark. If you have any ideas for fundraising (except getting the vicar to abseil down the tower - that one has already been mooted by the PCC!) then do let me know.

We continue to pray daily for the people of Broomfield. As we gradually ease out of lockdown we will be making decisions about how much worship provision to keep online and how to keep our buildings accessible, yet Covid safe. If you have any ideas or thoughts do please be in touch. We are also available to offer pastoral support, chat, cup of coffee or a prayer... do not hesitate to call either Rev'd. All of the above will just be 'HISTORY' if we FAIL to repair the SPIRE ROOF! I know you hear many times that churches need funds for roof repairs but this REALLY is the case!

The Spire roof is so BADLY damaged from water ingress that the timbers underneath the 'wood tiled shingles' are rotting and very soon, 'sadly', they will be unable to hold the heavy church bells. The shingle tiles are badly damaged by the birds (mainly woodpeckers) and the holes 'now' present are large enough for squirrels to enter and make a home for themselves; the rain is just flooding through!

The repair needed will cost £150,000 – we have raised £70,000 so far over the last 5 years!

But time IS RUNNING OUT and we NEED YOUR HELP! Its been a tough year for everyone, the Church has suffered too as donations have been very 'light' as we have only been able to offer 'online services' for most of this last year.

This photo was taken, standing directly underneath the Spire Roof, where the bells are also held for ringing. You can see the light coming in from the damaged holes in the roof.



Did you know there is a 'Fresco' painting in the tower? The 'only' modern/20th century Fresco painting in England? This was painted by the famous artist Rosemary Rutherford in 1942. The painting is of 'Christ stilling the storm'. It was painted on wet plaster during a break from the war.



The wood shingle roof tiles are now badly damaged with serious major holes, where rain water is then damaging the timbers beneath. This Spire roof also 'houses' the church bells.

#### He's at it again!

Our wonderful ancient church, St. Mary's, tower with its wooden shingled spire needs repair.



In 2019 I walked through the rainswept Galician countryside on the Camino de Santiago to raise funds for the tower. At that time over £3,000 was generously donated. Over half the target of the cost of repair/restoration to the tower, spire and the Rutherford fresco has been raised but the balance of £80,000 is urgently needed.

So I am once again on the move. This time nearer to home. I shall be walking 140 kms through Suffolk and Norfolk, initially following a Neolithic trackway across Suffolk – Peddars Way – and then heading down the coast along the North Norfolk Coast Path.

The origins of the name 'Peddars Way' are lost in the mists of time. Some suggest it is a corruption of the Latin "to walk" whilst others suggest it was a term commonly used in the 16th century for a track but the route, albeit a Roman road (built by the indigenous Iceni under Roman supervision in AD6), existed well before the Roman occupation of these islands. It was most likely a trading route leading to and from the coast.

It's importance in the Middle Ages lay in linking the Priories of Thetford and Castle Acre with the chapel named in honour of St. Edmund, England's first patron saint and King of the East Saxons, martyred by the Vikings in 855. The chapel marks the supposed spot where Edmund landed when he first arrived in England.

However, at the beginning of the coast path we come to the site of the wooden "henges" at Home-next-to-Sea (discovered in 1998) said to date to 2050BC – the central stone at Stonehenge is said to date to 2500 BC.

The walk will take me through much of East Anglia's ancient history. Will YOU help me save Broomfield's ancient history and save the tower of one of Essex' wonderful round tower churches?

Chloe went onto explain why she chose her area of nursing. "I've always enjoyed the surgical side of things as I'm fascinated by the modern technology. And I just love wounds! Nursing is a great job providing you have the compassion; it's a real vocation."

#### **News from Broomfield Cricket & Football Club**

The Broomfield sporting community was very sad to hear of the sad passing of Gary Stubbings in April this year.

Gary died at the age of 63 after bravely battling illness for a few years. Gary lived in Broomfield all his life, having attended Broomfield Primary School and residing in Church Ave and New Rd.

Local sport was a huge part of Gary's life - he was a member of Broomfield Football Club in the 70's and 80's. Gary also was often seen running the line and he also qualified as a referee.

Gary was perhaps better known locally at Broomfield Cricket Club where he was the match reporter and scorer for over 20 years.

His match reports at the Cricket Club attracted the attention of the Essex Chronicle and from 1988 Gary became Sports Editor at the newspaper, a post he held for 21 years and one that earned him his enduring nickname of "Scoop". During this time, he was always supportive in continuing to cover the exploits of the local teams.

It helped that Gary was also a keen Chelmsford City and West Ham Utd fan and often attended home games at New Writtle St as a fan and as a reporter. Not content with sport, music was Gary's other passion and for a number of years he was the resident DJ at the Kings Arms pub.

Gary also ran a number of discos at the Cricket Club and other local venues over the years.

#### About the reserve


Although small in size, this diverse nature reserve boasts over 230 species of plants among the rough grassland, thorn thicket and woodland habitats.

Yellow Cowslips and Hairy Violets bloom in the spring while by midsummer, the path to the river is awash with colour, from purple Knapweed to yellow Common St John's Wort. Flitting among the wildflowers are many Butterfly species, while along the river Kingfisher feed.

Walk through the woodland, passing Pale Wood Violets, Twayblade Orchids and Wood Spurge and listen to the woodland birds singing amongst the trees.


